Architect Lenhox sent a long letter to the committee in answer to enquiries as to the progress being made towards the completion of the new municipal buildings. He says there are 35 carpenters, 58 plumbers, steam and gasfitters, 34 plasterers and lathers, 10 bricklayers and laborers, and 40 excavators, including teamsters, now employed on the buildings, a total of 177, and more will be added in a few days. The cut stone and masonry work cannot be started just yet, because of lack of material. This, however, is not causing any delay in the other departments. Mr. Lennox says he is arranging accommodation for the different departments to their satisfaction, and without much difficulty.

Carlyle made a kick about the city paying for Inspector Summers' services. He claimed that Mr. Lennox should pay Summers, and will bring the matter up in Council when the pay sheets appear. Ald. Lamb defended the appointment of Summers, which was made by the Board of Control, claiming that the architect could not be at the buildings all day and that someone should be constantly watching the city's—interests in the work that is being done, and that that someone should be paid by the city.


