The following interesting letter was received by Mrs. J. Lee. secretary of the her brother, Corp. Fred Clayton, C. E. F.,

"We are just back in the lines after a three weeks' rest which was very much appreciated, for it is a different part and quite a pienic in comparison with the famous Viny Ridge, where we were previously stationed before we went on rest. We are billeted in a quaint little village. My section was put in a little barn, but we always had the privilege of hunting up a private billet, so nine of us went and secured a large room in a rather comfortable house. We have all kinds of straw and so are able to fix up a nice soft bed and the use of a good kitchen, where we may read, write and smoke. The madam, whose husband is in the trenches, is very young and not bad looking, and she is very good to us. When we come home from the trenches, which is practically an everyday occurrence, they always willingly make us a cup of coffee and always allow us the use of the stove; and there is one more great comfort we have, and that is the electric light, the whole lot costing us only twenty cents a week. The weather is not very pleasant just now and it has been continually raining for the last three days, and it has been hard going and coming from the trenches, for it is pitch dark and one is everlastingly falling over barbed wire and into shell holes, and I cash assure you that when it is like that there is no such thing as religion.
