POET D'ANNUNZIO
IS SOME SPIELER

In High Falutin' Language
Proclaims the New State
of Quarnero.

Fiume, Sept. 10.—The ceremony
of proclaiming the "Italian regency of
Quarnero" took place Thursday before
the palace in the presence of D'An-
nuzio's legionaries and the town-
people. D'Annunzio, as head of the
new state, took the following oath:
"I, Gabriele D'Annunzio, first
legionary of the legion of Fiume, in
the name of the Italian people, I swear
on this sacred banner of youth, on
this relic of heroic blood, and on my
sacred duty to continue to fight with
every force and every arm, until my
last breath, against everybody and
everything, that the Italian soil may
never be united to Italy."
D'Annunzio addressed his soldiers
and citizens before taking the oath,
saying that if they desired to adopt
the new constitution, which, he said,
he was obliged to submit to them be-
fore September 12, owing to certain
news he had received from Paris.
The populace received the announce-
ment with affirmative applause.
D'Annunzio then proclaimed the de-
voted and eternal interpreter of free
will, expressed by acclamation of a
majority of the sovereign people.
In Fiume, in parliament assembled from
this balcony, where was announced
the liberation of the city on Septem-
ber 12, 1919, and where many times
was confirmed the eternal will of
Fiume toward the mother country."

FIRST BAD ACCIDENT
IN BROOKLYN STRIKE

New York, Sept. 10.—Today—Fri-
day, and the thirtieth day of the
Brooklyn Rapid Transit walk-out, was
marked by the first serious accident
since the strike began.
Approximately 35 persons were in-
jured, 15 seriously, when a Coney
Island sight-seeing bus, with 70 men,
women and children aboard, was in
collision with a trolley car at Fifth
avenue and Sixty-ninth street, Brook-
lyn. Police reserves and ambulances
were called, and first aid was rendered
at the scene. A vacant lot nearby
was struck by the trolley, and the
driver of the car, as well as the
driver of the bus, were held on techni-
cal charges.

to the terms which grant benefits and
protection from the state."

SHIP.

London, Sept. 10.—A wireless de-
patch received here tonight from the
British tank steamer Tiscarora, from
Halifax to London, says that the ves-
sel has on board the captain and 20
men from the small Greek steamer
Ella, which was abandoned.

MORE SHOCKS ADD
TO LIST OF DEAD

Rescuers in Italian Devastated
District Killed by Fall-
ing Walls.

Rome, Sept. 10.—Earthquake shocks
continue, causing more victims among
the rescuers owing to falling masonry.
Today there were shocks as far south
as Cassino near Naples. Apparently
there was no serious damage nor vic-
tims, but the shocks produced great
panic among the population, which
recalled its experiences in the earth-
quakes of 1915.
Quake in the Alps.
Geneva, Switzerland, Sept. 10.—A
strong earthquake shook the southern
slope of the Swiss Alps yesterday
yesterday from Monte Rosa to Bernia
Pass. The shock was accompanied by
heavy snowfalls and several Alpine
villages are isolated. Four persons
are reported to have been killed and
many injured.
Slighter shocks also were reported
in the Swiss Alps around Zermatt and
Pontresina, but there were no casual-
ties.

HUNGER STRIKER
TO BE KEPT ALIVE

Father of Boy in Cork Jail
Has Given Permission to
the Nuns.

Cork, Sept. 10.—The father of
Sean Hennessey, the 19-year-old lad
who is on a hunger strike in Cork
jail, consented today to permit the
nuns to try to keep him alive until
it is possible to present to the gov-
ernment proofs of his innocence.
These proofs, it is asserted, have
been obtained.
The nuns, under direction of the
government's physician, are endeavor-
ing to ameliorate Hennessey's con-
dition. The physician today told the
correspondent that not only Hennes-
sey but Michael Burke, Michael
O'Reilly and Donavan, an extremely
critical condition and that it
was problematical whether the lives
of any of them could be saved, even
if they were released immediately.

next meeting of the appeal.

DIFFER ON METHOD
OF FIGHTING RATES

Open Breach Reported in
High Phone Cost Case Be-
tween Montreal and Here.

Montreal, Sept. 10.—The methods
policies in the fight being led by
the Union of Canadian Municipali-
ties against the proposed increase
applied for by the Bell Telephone Com-
pany, in their rates, has apparently
developed an open breach, with re-
sulting differences in Montreal, on the
one hand, and Toronto and Hamilton
on the other, according to the state-
ment of Chairman Decary of the Mon-
real administrative committee, who
presided at the meeting of delegates of
the union, held at noon today, to dis-
cuss the matter.
Mr. Decary told the meeting that he
had heard last week that Toronto was
going ahead with preparation of their
case independently of the rest of the
municipalities.
Decary Comes to Toronto.
He thereupon went to Toronto to con-
fer with officials there. When he met
the controllers he was asked if he would
offer any objections to Toronto audi-
tors of the company, and when he
assented it was further suggested that
Toronto experts also be employed in the
matter, to the exclusion of those from
Montreal. The Montreal experts were
violently assailed by those from
and the Toronto gentlemen held the
door of the Montreal men the responsi-
bility for the increases granted the com-
pany last year.
The conference, according to the re-
port of the chairman of the adminis-
trative commission, ended in a stormy
discussion and no satisfactory working
agreement was arrived at.
Chairman Decary also told the meet-
ing that there had been an active pro-
gram carried on in the Toronto news-
papers against Montreal's rates. He
assented to that further effort at con-
sultation on his part met with the reply
that Toronto and Hamilton had decided
to fight their own battle.
