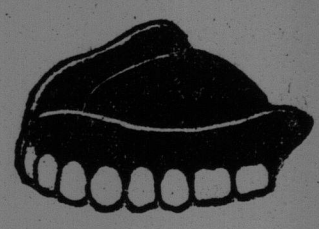

He Passed Through on His Way to Halifax From the West.

Speaking of the anti-Japanese feeling prevailing in British Columbia, Sir Charles Hibbert said the whole trouble was caused by the fact that the Japs, like the Hindus, of whom there were a number in the province, furnish cheaper labor, thus creating the antagonism of the laboring class.

He expressed the opinion that unless plenty of labor can be had the progress of the province will be retarded, and while whites were preferable, if no other class of labor is obtainable it would be better to employ Orientals than hamper progress.
