Fredericton Jubilant Over Queens County Find

Fredericton, N. B., Sept. 28.—Anthracite discovered fifty miles from this city is the joyful news floating about here today. Captain Russell Bellamy of New York, a student and geologist, has had a license from the New Brunswick government to explore for silver which he believes was to be found in the Salmon River district of Queens county. His investigations brought him to a strata which proves to be coal very closely resembling the anthracite of Pennsylvania. Tests made show it to produce an intense heat. It is almost odorless and clinkers. It ignites quickly but burns slowly. It is estimated conservatively that there is at least a half million tons in sight. Understanding it is a strata of blacksmith coal.

Isolation Hospital for Fredericton

Fredericton, N. B., Sept. 28.—The board of health and a special committee of the city council met last night and discussed the matter of the erection of an isolation hospital building in Fredericton. The committee agreed with the board of health that a new isolation hospital is necessary, but the cost of a suitable building is greater than was anticipated. It is probable that the city authorities will have plans prepared, and if it is deemed advisable, assess for it next year and proceed with the erection of the structure in the spring.
