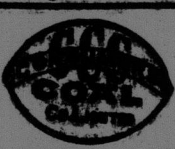

PROHIBITION IN KANSAS

To the Editor of The Times:

Sir:—The facts have stated on the authority of the attorney general of Kansas City, Kansas.

While the state of Kansas had a prohibition law for more than thirty years, there were cities and towns that resisted the law and conducted a system of monthly fines, which amounted to as much as the license and among these was Kansas City, Missouri, and between these two cities there was a naturally great rivalry.

In 1906 Attorney General Coleman signified his intention of obeying the law and closing all drinking places on the Kansas side of the river. This caused consternation among business men who feared that the majority of the business would go to the west side of the river. A large and influential deputation of Kansas City politicians, bankers, law, etc., and others called on the

attorney general to persuade him to drop a project which they felt sure would ruin that part of the city and their arguments were very impressive. The attorney general listened patiently but informed them that he was there to enforce the law and that he intended to do his duty. They went away as indignant and angry lot of men.

A year later Mr. Jackson, was appointed attorney general and it was rumored that he would not enforce the law. Soon a deputation of the same men as had called on Attorney General Coleman called on Mr. Jackson, but they came on a different mission. They said "For God's sake don't let the old rotten order of things return to Kansas City for it never was as prosperous as now."

RECENT DEATHS

The Earl of Kilmory died in London yesterday of pneumonia. He was seventy-three years old. He was prominent in sports, theatricals and later politics. The heir is Francis Charles Adelbert Henry Newham, Viscount of Newry and Moore, eldest son of the earl. He is thirty-two years of age.

Mrs. D. O. Bourgois died Sunday night at her home in St. Leonard's after a brief illness. She was in the seventy-third year of her age. Her funeral took place on Wednesday morning.

Mrs. John McMurray died at her home in Rexton, N. B., on Tuesday after a two months illness of heart trouble. She is survived by her husband, one sister and an adopted daughter.

Mrs. Mary Lynch died at her residence in Digby, N. S., on Wednesday after a lengthy illness. She was the widow of George Lynch, formerly of this city. She is survived by two sisters and two step-sons.

BLIND MAN SAVED OTHERS BUT LOST HIS OWN LIFE

Pawtucket, R. I., July 20.—Henry Herrick, a blind man, died after some hours in hospital, as a result of his efforts to save the lives of his neighbors in the Ellis Block, a four-story building in Main street. He lived with his crippled son on the third floor of the building and about 8 a. m. he awoke and smelled smoke in his room.

He awakened his son. He then groped his way into the corridor and knocked at the door of Mrs. Levi Moreau and warned her and her two young children. He afterward proceeded to the doors of other tenants and awakened them.

The flames later found him lying unconscious in the corridor, almost suffocated by the smoke and suffering from serious burns. He was taken to the hospital, where he died about noon. Herrick's son, Robert, and Mrs. Moreau and her two children were also taken to the hospital suffering from burns.

WRITES HOME FROM GERMAN PRISON CAMP

Corinth, Me., July 27.—George J. Fitz, who was taken prisoner by the Germans while serving with the Canadian troops in Europe and who is now a prisoner of war at Giessen, has written his fourth letter since his capture to his parents here. Mr. and Mrs. James G. Fitz. He has been a prisoner since April 26. His letter is as follows:

My Dear Mother:—I am no longer at Giessen Camp, though my address has not changed. There are twenty of us working on the road several miles from Giessen. It is rather hard for me as I am not much of a pick and shovel artist, but they seem aware of the fact and are not hard on me. I would prefer something in my own line of work. In one way it is better for us to have something to do. It is far healthier for us than in a camp where there are large numbers of men.

It is a very pretty place where we are staying. It is a small village of a quaint old-fashioned type and makes me think of Longfellow's Acadia. "There the rich are poor and the poorest live in abundance."

More and more every day do I see wonder at the system which extends all over this country, which enables Germans to carry on this mighty struggle. They are as one great united people, placing all confidence in the strength of their arms and the ability of their leaders. Truly there never was seen the like of this in all the world.
