

N. S. PREMIER BRINGS CHEERY WORD FROM MEET

Provincial Ministers
Pledge Assistance to
the Maritimes

RAILWAY TAXES

C. N. R. Agrees to Pay \$91,000
Annually on Lines in
Nova Scotia

HALIFAX, June 15.—"Resolutions of the utmost importance to the Maritime Provinces and especially affecting the coal industry, were unanimously adopted at the conference of provincial premiers held in Ottawa last week, and I cannot express too highly my appreciation of the splendid spirit evidenced on the part of representatives of the other provinces, who showed most emphatically that they have a real desire to aid in the solution of our problems."

So declared Hon. E. N. Rhodes, pre-

mier of Nova Scotia, upon his return to the capital last evening from Ottawa, where together with Hon. J. O. Douglas, attorney general, he represented Nova Scotia, at the conference of provincial ministers.

Premier Rhodes said that in addition to the resolutions passed, it had been arranged that the Canadian National Railways should pay to the government of Nova Scotia annually the sum of \$91,000 as taxes on the Nationally operated railways in this province. This agreement will be retroactive for two years.

While in Ottawa, Premier Rhodes held several conferences with members of the Federal government, with a view to arriving at some solution of the situation, which exists in the steel industry in Nova Scotia. The Premier said that his efforts in this regard were non-political, and he had sought only to find some common ground upon which the federal and provincial governments could unite to aid this industry.

The resolution passed by the conference of premiers, and urging upon the federal government the importance of adopting such measures as would alleviate the position of the provinces, which under consideration have not progressed as was expected, was moved by Attorney General Nickle of Ontario, and seconded by Premier Taschereau of Quebec. This resolution received the unanimous support of the conference, and during the session on repeated occasions gave expression to their real desire and purpose to assist the Eastern portion of Canada in solving its problems.

Attorney General Douglas presented a resolution to the conference having particular reference to the adoption by the federal government, of a national fuel policy and to the establishment of coking plants through which Canadian coal will be able to replace American anthracite in the Canadian market.

C. N. R. OFFICIAL AT MONCTON BEREAVED

A. T. Weldon Receives News
of Death of Mother in Atlantic City

She is survived by three sons, Walter H., Smoketown, Wash.; Edwin of Boston; Albert of Moncton; also two daughters, Misses Sadie and Ethel of Atlantic City, with whom she was residing and one brother, E. B. Hicks of Moncton. Mrs. Weldon left yesterday afternoon for New York where he will meet the body and expects to leave on Tuesday bringing the body to Dorchester, arriving there on Thursday afternoon. Burial will take place at Upper Dorchester following the arrival of the train.

TAXATION REPORT BY HALIFAX LADY

Mrs. E. M. Murray Leads Dis-
cussion at National Council
of Women

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 15.—A report on "taxation" placed before the National Council delegates on Monday afternoon, by Mrs. E. M. Murray of Halifax, deals at great length with taxation problems throughout the Dominion. Mention was made of the four canons which have been adopted by the National Council of Women, namely:

- 1.—A tax should be levied so as not to fall heavily upon the general fund of wealth so as to hamper production.
- 2.—A tax should be easily and cheaply collected so as not to take from the producer an unjust amount and also to ensure the government getting the greater possible return from the tax.
- 3.—It should be certain so as not to encourage perjury or bribery, as a means of evading it.
- 4.—It should be equal so as not to place one at an advantage or disadvantage as compared with another.

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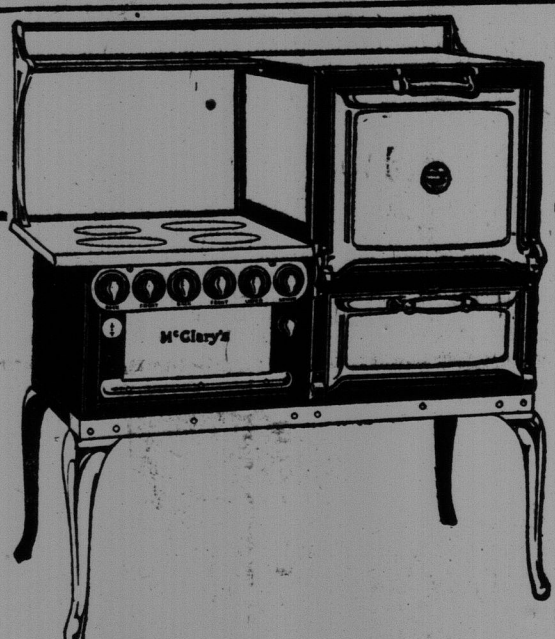
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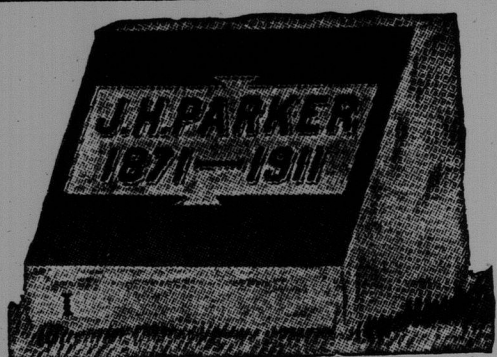
