Policemen on an Inspector's staff are commonly known as plainclothes men, and the work they are called to do is of a somewhat different nature than that of members of the Detective Bureau.

The men of the bureau are chiefly interested in investigating such crimes as burglaries, felonious assaults, and murders and in apprehending the perpetrators, whereas the Inspector's men are interested in upholding the morals of the community. It is their duty to see that vice, gambling and kindred crimes are kept down.

The new plainclothes men get experiences that he did not encounter on patrol. He becomes thoroughly acquainted with gamblers' methods. He gets to know the tricks they use to hook with the police. It is a common thing for two plainclothes men to engineer a raid by themselves and corner twenty-five or fifty devotees of craps or racing.

A certain plainclothes man, finding no way to enter a Harlem building which a game was in progress, went to the roof and dropped through a skylight into a group of astonished negro craps shooters. The policeman marched his prisoners through the streets to the station house while gazing denials of the neighborhood looked on.
