ARRIVE HOME FROM BOSTON

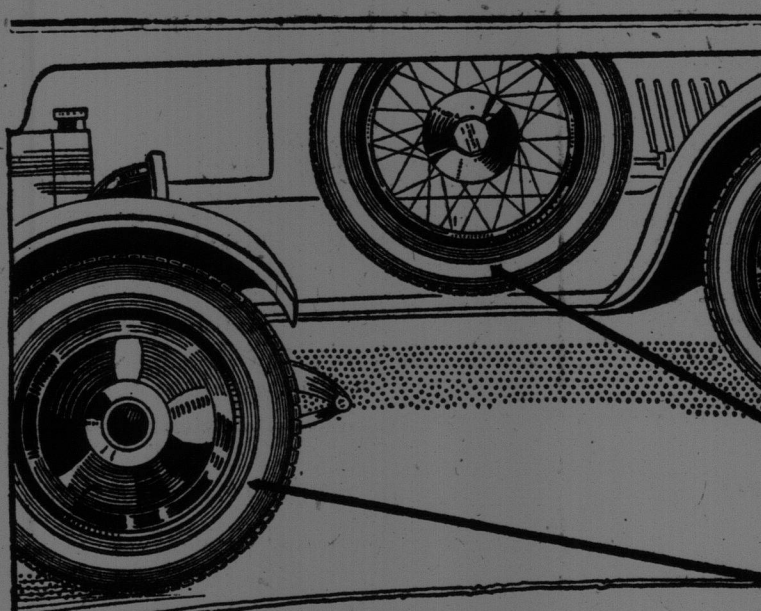
Members of N. B. Tourist

STUDENT KILLED IN LAB. BLAST

Banker's Son Victim of an
Unexplained Explosion of
Chemicals.

New York, June 11.—An explosion of chemicals with which he was experimenting in the laboratory of the Clark School, 78 Riverside Drive, resulted in the death of Kemper Louis, seventeen years old, a student, an hour later in Knickerbocker Hospital. The explosion drove a tiny bit of copper into the boy's groin, severing an artery and he died to death.

Louis, who lived with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Kemper Louis, was performing an experiment in the laboratory when the chemicals exploded without warning.

The blast burned his face severely, tore both hands in many places and also drove a minute fragment of copper into his left groin. The copper is believed to have been a section of the receptacle in which Louis had placed the chemicals. It measured only a sixteenth of an inch by an eighth of an inch, according to Assistant Medical Examiner Charles Cassasa, but it tore its way into the youth's body deep enough to sever an artery.

An instructor, who heard the explosion, ran into the room and found Louis on the floor. He summoned an ambulance from Knickerbocker Hospital.

Louis was taken to the hospital at 8:30 p. m. and at 4:40 p. m. he died. Assistant Medical Examiner Cassasa and the police of the West Sixty-eighth Street Station were notified and started an investigation into the cause of the explosion.

Dr. Cassasa, in examining the student's body, found in the groin the piece of copper which is believed to have caused death. He said that other fragments of the copper vessel containing the chemicals which exploded might be found in the student's body, but the tiny fragment he discovered undoubtedly killed Louis.

The left hand had been badly torn by the explosion. The right had also been injured, but less severely. Dr. Cassasa said that from the numerous lacerations of the left hand it appeared that the hand had been resting on or near the receptacle containing the chemicals when the explosion occurred.

The boy's father, Edward Kemper Louis, who is in the banking business, declared last night that his son had been preparing at the Clark School for Yale University and had been specializing in chemistry. He was in the freshman class. He had not been able to learn the full details of the explosion, he said.

Tenants in an apartment house adjoining the Clark School heard the explosion. It was not heavy enough, however, to do any damage to the building.

W. H. White, formerly manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce in Moncton, has been transferred to Woodstock, Ontario, and left for there on Saturday.

APPRECIATE WANT OF A NEW STATION

J. E. Dalrymple, Vice-President of C. N. R., Here on
Inspection Trip.

J. E. Dalrymple of Montreal, newly appointed vice-president of the Canadian National Railways arrived in St. John early yesterday morning and spent the day inspecting railway property about the city. In the morning he inspected Canadian property on this side of the harbor and at Courtenay Bay and in the afternoon the immigration quarters on the West Side. In an interview he said that the long felt want of a new station for the city was under serious consideration at the present time. He said the C. N. R. was pushing its immigration policy with vigor and that encouraging results were being achieved. He will leave this evening for Quebec over the Valley railroad.

Accompanying Mr. Dalrymple were the following C. N. R. officials: Frank J. Watson, freight traffic manager; H. H. McLanahan, passenger traffic manager; R. E. Perry, assistant general freight agent at Montreal; A. T. Weldon; F. W. Robertson, Moncton; and M. F. Tompkins, Moncton.

REVISION OF THE PUBLIC HOSPITAL CONSTITUTION

The committee of the Board of Commissioners of the General Public Hospital which has in hand the revision of the constitution and by-laws of the hospital met on Saturday and made good progress with the work assigned to it. All of the members of the committee attended. The committee members are: M. E. Agar, Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, J. King Kelly, Mrs. J. Varner McLellan and Dr. E. J. Ryan. It is probable that the committee will have a report to submit to the next general meeting of the hospital commissioners next month. Pending the drawing up of the new constitution there have been no staff appointments made this year.

The new out-patient department of the General Public Hospital will be opened soon and, for the size of the hospital, is probably one of the finest in Canada. It is situated in the basement west wing of the hospital. As soon as it is opened, the X-ray department will be removed to the rooms at present occupied by the out-door department on the main floor of the hospital.

The baths will be in operation whenever the temperature reaches seventy-five degrees, or seventy-two degrees if the humidity is great, for the use of children between the hours of 10.30 to 11.30 a. m., 3.30 to 4.30 p. m., and 7.30 to 8.30 p. m., and for adults where the demand is great enough, between 9.30 and 10.30 p. m.
