Peace Foundation Says They Account For Three-Forths of Government Ex-peditures Since 1789.

Boston, Nov. 10—The World Peace Foundation in a statement gave figures compiled from reports of the Secretary of the Treasury which it said showed that the United States Government in the 131 years of its existence under the Constitution had spent nearly four-fifths of its total ordinary disbursements on war or things relating to war. Tables prepared by the foundation showed total ordinary disbursements from 1789 to 1920 of \$66,728,209,409, of which the war items amounted to \$52,607,489,927 or 78.5 per cent.
