CHALLENGE GOVERNMENT TO ELECTION

Liberals Would Abide by People's Decision on Naval Question—Session Closes With Dr. Pugsley's Ringing Challenge.

Ottawa, June 6.—The close of parliament today came at the end of a speech by the Hon. Wm. Pugsley.

Premier Borden denounced the senate for its action regarding the naval bill and said that if the Conservatives remain in power they will take steps to take over and pay for the three dreadnoughts which the British government is preparing to lay down.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier denied flatly that he had influenced the senate to take the action which it did upon the naval bill. He said the senate had acted on its own initiative and its own responsibility and, he declared, had done nothing but defend the right of the Canadian people.

"Have they done violence to the constitution?" he asked.

"Have they infringed upon the rights of the people? No. They have simply made provision not that the bill be rejected but that it be not assented to until submitted to the judgment of the people."

"The fact that these three Canadian ships were to be in addition to the new vessels, said by the admiralty to be sufficient to meet the situation, was hailed with delight by the jingo papers in the old country, and it was equally a subject of criticism by newspapers like the London Daily News and the Manchester Guardian, because they said it forced upon the British taxpayers the maintenance of three battleships that were regarded by the admiralty as unnecessary."

"It turns out, however,—if Mr. Churchill is correctly reported,—that these three ships were not to be in addition to the admiralty programme, and that they would not increase the strain of safety, but be included only as a part of that margin, and that Canada was not providing for an emergency but for a portion of the regular British navy budget."

"A short time ago," Sir Wilfrid said, "the government members were declaring that Britain would not carry the naval load alone, that assistance must be given, that the proposed dreadnoughts would be an addition to the construction programme of admiralty. Now, according to press despatches, Britain was to build the ships. Now we know," he said, "that it was not a defence emergency that lay back of the government's proposals. These proposals constituted simply a part in the policy of contribution to the regular naval programme of Britain."

Sir Wilfrid Challenges.

"Our policy is a Canadian navy, built in Canada, manned and maintained by Canada. That is our policy and we stand by it, and I invite the prime minister to give us an opportunity to test it before the people."

"The senate has been loyal to the con-

stitution, loyal to Canada and loyal to the empire in the action which it took," said Hon. Dr. Pugsley. "The bill of the government sought to do an unconstitutional thing which the people of Canada would not approve of."

"If the people of Canada were in favor of the contribution the government could easily arrange to have it sent. All that the government has to do is to appeal to the people. If they are returned they can introduce this bill and it will be carried without opposition in either house. The whole thing could be done and the money placed in the hands of the British admiralty within six weeks, long before Mr. Churchill could arrange to lay down the keels of the three ships in England."

"If the people do not favor contribution and say so, a Canadian navy will at once be started."

"It is a thousand pities that the minister of marine did not accept the tender of Gamal Laird & Co. If he had ratified the contract which we left ready for his signature ships of the Canadian fleet would now be under construction in St. John."

The black rod knocked at the door of the chamber and the second session of the twelfth parliament of Canada closed with the minister of marine trying to make himself heard.
