FIVE MILLION FOR A STEEL PLANT IN WEST

Western Corporation to Establish Town Site on Fraser River—From Nails to Structural Steel

(Canadian Press) Toronto, April 10-That the western steel rporation has purchased 2,000 acres of corporation has purchased 2,000 acres of land with 17,000 feet water frontage on the Fraser River, and will survey it as a townsite and erect a large steel plant in the course of the next three yars at an expenditure of about \$5,000,000 was the announcement of Robert E. Kennedy, of ew Westminster, last evening.
A start will be made on the plant th year, and it is expected to expend \$1,500, 000 on the first section. It will manutacture articles varying from horseshoe nails to structural steel.

Ottawa. April 10—While excavating a building site in Queen street, workmen have come upon six skulls of human beings. There was once a grave-yard there.

Berlin, April 10—An airship intended for trans-Atlantic travel, is projected here and a company capitalized at \$2,000,000 has been formed to finance the scheme.

The proposed dirigible will be eight times larger than Zeppelins new Deutschland. The plans call for a vessel 775 feet long, driven by thirty motors. It will be able to carry 200 passengers in addition to a crew of 100.
