NO UNEMPLOYMENT LEGISLATION FOR PRESENT SESSION.

Statement of Premier King in House Yesterday—The Government to Pay One-third of Relief Cost for ex-Servicemen.

Ottawa, Feb. 21.—(Canadian Press)—Premier King stated in the House yesterday that the government did not consider that the present unemployment situation necessitated the bringing down of unemployment legislation this session.

The question was raised by E. J. Murray, (Liberal, Winnipeg, North) who brought up the unemployment situation in Winnipeg. He was informed, he said, that there were now 6,181 unemployed receiving relief in that city of which 1,500 were being assisted by the Dominion Government.

Hon. James Murdock, Minister of Labor, referred to telegrams sent in December last, in reply to queries from the Premier of Manitoba and British Columbia, stating that the situation was not comparable to that of the last two years and that the Dominion Government did not feel itself justified in assuming any portion of the obligations of the municipalities and provinces in regard to unemployment.

Aid to Veterans.

Within the last thirty years, Mr. Murdock added, deputations had represented to the government that there was a considerable unemployment affecting returned men and that voluntary organizations of returned soldiers and others were providing for them, in some cases with the co-operation of the municipality concerned. As a result of these representations an order-in-council had been adopted providing that, in the case of ex-servicemen who were unemployed and in need of relief the Dominion Government would pay one-third of the cost. The order-in-council provided that payments under it might be retroactive to a first of January.

The redistribution bill was given a second reading without debate. The next procedure is expected to be a motion to refer the bill to a special committee.

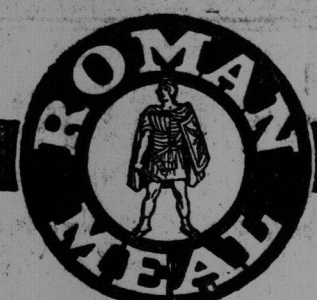
OBSERVE FRANCES.

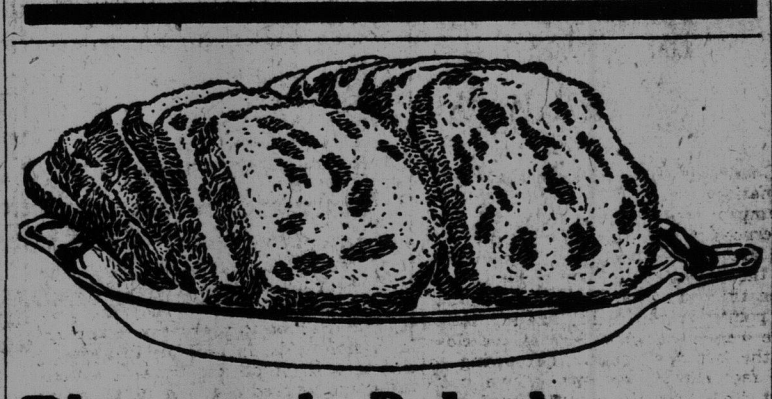

Sagre, Pa., Feb. 21.—Failure of the engineer to heed a block signal was declared the cause of a wreck at Runnells, Pa., yesterday in an unofficial investigation from divisional headquarters of the Lehigh Valley Railroad last night.

Train No. 17 piloted by Engineer W. A. Shellenberger, crashed into a caboose drawn by two engines, demolishing it and killing six trainmen, including Shellenberger.

According to report train No. 17 ran automatic block signal and a tugman.

LONDON BECOMING KNOWN AS CITY OF DREADFUL CABS

Groaning, Grinding and Rattling of Machinery Called Usual State of Vehicles.

London, Feb. 1.—(By Mail).—According to "The London Daily Express" London is in danger of becoming known as the City of Dreadful Cabs—the city where if a man hails a taxicab he stands an even chance of entering one whose gears grind, whose engine groans, whose windows rattle, whose springs are rusty, and whose only efficient component is the meter, which ticks off the three pence with never a falter.

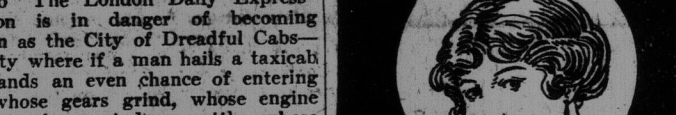
That is the strange part of it. When a man takes a taxicab he pays neither for comfort, efficiency, nor speed. He pays the meter's three pence whether the cab be good or bad. Usually it is bad. There are probably more obsolete taxicabs to the mile in the streets of London than in those of any other city, except, perhaps, Paris.

A "Daily Express" representative spent an hour or two in carrying out

taxicab tests. It was a trying experience. One or two of the cabs were good—comfortable, reasonably fast, and relatively silent. The majority were noisy, uncomfortable, and slow.
