Chicago, April 19.—(United Press.)—Firearms killed more people in the United States than the automobile in 1921, the latest year for which complete statistics are available, declared Richard E. Kropf, Supreme Regent of the Royal Arcanum, in an address on safety here. Motor-car fatalities for this period numbered 12,500, as against 14,450 for firearms, he said.
