## PEANUT PUR...

For those who do not eat much meat. One pint of peanuts, roasted, shelled and skin removed, pound to a paste (Peanut butter may be used if preferred), 1-4 teapint white stock, 1 teapint salt, 1-4 teapint pepper, 1 pint milk 2 tablespoonfuls of flour. Scald milk, add peanut and stock, thicken with flour mixed with enough water to form a smooth paste, add seasoning and serve with oyster crackers if one likes them.

## GRIDDLE CAKES.

Into one cup of sweet milk stir enough flour, with one teaspoon of baking powder sifted in it to make a smooth, creamy batter, add a good-sized pinch of salt, pour on to a hot buttered griddle and fry to a golden brown, turning carefully to preserve the round, even shape. If sour milk is used, dissolve one teaspoon of soda in it, and omit the baking powder. An egg or eggs may be added, but they rather toughen the cakes than add to their goodness.
