Dr. Rainford in Toronto.
The Rev. Mr. Rainford has been almost all classes within the Church of England by storm, and seems to have broken down the walls which separated the different sections of the Anglican communion from the Roman Catholic and Protestant Churches. There have been lately witnessed in the Cathedral Church of Toronto occurrences which have been declared not only unlikely, but absolutely impossible. Ang. Catholics and Protestants, without slightest claims to apostolic succession, have raised their voices within consecrated buildings, and in extemporaneous prayer led the devotions of earnest and orthodox Churchmen. The Low and High have found a common ground to meet upon, and Puseyites and Evangelicals have, with almost equal fervor, sung vespertine hymns and extemporaneous prayers. Perhaps there is no other cathedral building within the pale of the Anglican Church in all its sections which has ever been the scene of such transactions. The usual quiet has been entirely broken up, and the regular routine of service appointed by something much more lively and attractive. We shall not say how many "Disensurers" have been asked to take part in these services, but we know of some who with mingled astonishment and gratitude told that for the first time they have been engaged in the time being, for the simple reason that in the presence of a more powerful influence the attendance had almost entirely disappeared. Even clergymen who have had the greatest horror of enthusiasm, and have shrunk with unaccounted disgust from excitement and fanaticism, have been themselves carried away by the fervor, and influenced by the same means which stirred and swayed the ordinary and less cultivated masses. The youthful evangelist has found his rites and clerical millinery have been the most unlikely. He has been offered places not only where evangelism chiefly prevails, but where High Churchism is paramount, and where the services of the outer air, they are performed with minute hebes at distances of about four inches.
