(c) Adoption of the Hare-Spence system of voting. It stimulates a healthy interest in public affairs, and makes corruption a more difficult matter.

(d) Practical sympathy for crippled citizens. There are so many dangerous machines now used in daily toil that the number of maimed people fighting life's battle under painful odds is quite noticeable. We therefore suggest that in all government appointments cripples who have passed the civil service exams and are competent to do the work, shall have the preference.

(e) Constituencies to have power to recall their representatives when such representatives fail to represent
