TEMPERANCE COLUMN.

Trust the people—the wise and the ignorant, the good and the bad—with the gravest questions, and in the end you educate the race.

"Laying aside every weight." For example, take the "weight" of strong drink. How many a man, how many a minister of the gospel would have had a successful ministry if he had laid aside the "weight" of strong drink.

Just let me give you one instance. There was a company of clergymen met at a special meeting to discuss the subject of total abstinence, and a very clever paper was read by a very clever clergyman, and argued tooth and nail against the fanaticism of teetotalism; and his paper was so clever that when he sat down all the rest of the clergymen applauded him. There was silence, and on old clergyman that no one had noticed, about eighty years old, who was sitting in a corner of the room, rose up, and said: "My reverend brethren, I am a very old man, and I should like to say a few words to you. I once had a son. He was a noble boy, and to the age of twenty-one he never touched a drop of drink; but one day he was invited to dinner by a friend, and this friend persuaded my son to give up his pledge, by saying it was more manly to do what everybody else did, and to know how to control ones self, and my son was carried away by his friend's arguments, and began to take wine. A few years after that my son became a helpless drunkard; and oh, my reverend brethren, I laid my son in a drunkard's grave, and although I believe he truly tried to do a few months before he died, yet his constitution was so wrecked with drink that it was really the cause of his death; and my reverend brethren—and suddenly the old man drew himself up as straight as any possible—and my reverend brethren, the man that persuaded my son to break his pledge is that clergyman who has just read that paper to you. Oh, you murdered my son, sir, you murdered my son," and the old man sat down, in tears. I can tell you that that clever clergyman's paper had much effect at that clerical meeting after that. So I say to you, "Know your own weakness, brother," and say "Oh, my God, Thou knowest that I dare not bring gun-powder near thee, oh, God, I am weak, and even if I am not weak, my brother is weak," and, oh Lord, help me to set a consistent example, lest I become the cause, day or evening, of my brother's destruction, for "it is good neither to eat flesh, nor to drink wine, nor to do anything whereby thy brother stumbleth, or is ensnared, or is made weak."

Laurier's Cabinet.

Mr. Blair Will be the New Brunswick Representative.

Quebec Will Have Six Men in the New Government

Ontario Will Have Five—Col. Domville Will Not be Ignored.

Montreal, July 2.—It is stated tonight that Mr. Laurier's slate is as complete as it can be made until the government of the country is really in the liberal hands. Your correspondent learns that the several provinces will be represented as follows: Quebec—Laurier, Tarte, Geoffrion, Fisher and Fitzpatrick, holding portfolios, with another member yet to be decided upon without portfolio.

Ontario—Sir Oliver Mowat, Sir Richard Cartwright, Paterson, Mills and Edgar.

New Brunswick—Hon. A. G. Blair. Nova Scotia—Fraser of Guysboro and Dr. Borden of Kings.

Prince Edward Island—Hon. L. H. Davies.

It is understood that a gentleman west of the lakes will be chosen before the new ministry is complete, and that Attorney General Sifton may be the man, although Joe Martin's friends suggest that he should contest the seat in Brandon left vacant by Dalton McCarthy's decision to sit for North Simcoe, and enter the new government as minister of the interior.

It should be added that Mr. Laurier did not send for Col. Domville, but that the latter merely looked in upon the cabinet makers while en route for Ottawa. If, however, Col. Domville should be ignored, and it looks like it, it is said the gallant colonel will declare war to the knife upon Mr. Blair.

It is said here that Hon. L. O. Tallon will be tomorrow gazetted associate judge of the district of St. Francis.

Montreal, July 2.—Sir Richard Cartwright, Messrs. Blair, Mills, Davies, Paterson and Munton left for this evening. Mr. Fielding is still here.

This is how Hon. Mr. Laurier's program, La Patrie, treats the confederation anniversary: "This is the twenty-ninth anniversary of the Canadian confederation, and it will be celebrated by exciting English speaking compatriots by excursions, picnics, etc."

Ottawa, July 2.—Their excellencies Lord and Lady Aberdeen returned to the city shortly before six o'clock. A cordial welcome was given them, and they excellently drove to the seat block and remained at his office for a few minutes, after which he proceeded to government house. The premier left the state department at a quarter to two and proceeded to his son's residence at New Edinburgh to lunch. After lunch he went over to government house, which is not more than two minutes walk from Sir Hibberd's dwelling. There the premier had a lengthy interview with Lord Aberdeen. The council had been called together for four thirty by which time it was expected Sir Charles would be able to meet his colleagues, but it was close upon six o'clock when he arrived at the council chamber.

The premier came tripping cordially with the agility of a man of twenty years his junior, although today was the seventy-fifth anniversary of his birthday.

The ministers only sat for half an hour, and when Sir Charles emerged again he informed the waiting correspondents that there was nothing to announce. This was taken to mean that the government is still prepared to do business at the old stand, and indeed, the premier reiterated to your correspondent the statement of three or four days ago, that until the period for holding accounts has elapsed, the government will remain in office. These gists, therefore, who are building upon Mr. Laurier being premier by Saturday are doomed to disappointment.

WHEELER FOUND GUILTY

Judge Townshend's Charge in the Celebrated Case.

The Jury Were Out Two Hours Before Returning Their Verdict.

Sentenced to be Hanged at Digby on September Eighth Next.

Halifax, June 30.—Judge Townshend, charging the jury in the Wheeler murder trial this afternoon, commented on the beginning of the testimony of some of the witnesses, which, he thought, particularly strong against the prisoner.

The prisoner was shown to be in or near the house at the time of the murder. The prisoner's own denial of his presence at the house was shown to be false, and his explanations of the position of the body of the girl when discovered by him were inconsistent and open to the gravest suspicion. His whole statement seemed to be based on falsehood and deceit. The judge commented on the motives which appeared to exist in the case, and which, according to the testimony of the witnesses, pointed strongly against the prisoner. The charge was fully borne out by the evidence.

Throughout the charge the prisoner maintained a decidedly calm demeanor. The jury retired at 4:11 and were out two hours. When they returned with a verdict of "guilty," Wheeler,

services the public was allowed to view the remains, and a large number of colored people were present. Mrs. Henry Ward Beecher was among the relatives present.

BIG CLEVELAND STRIKE

Two Hundred and Fifty Policemen Protect Fifty-three Workmen.

A Serious Riot and the Militia Called Out to Preserve the Peace.

Cleveland, O., July 2.—The strike at the Brown Hoisting Co's works reached a point where the authorities as well as the strikers are in no mood for trifling. When the non-union men left the works this afternoon, there was rioting. Two hundred and fifty policemen emerged from the gates, guarding fifty-three workmen. An immense crowd had gathered, a block away, but the police took a new route and eluded them. The strikers set up a yell and ran, soon overtaking the marching column, hooting and yelling. A huge mob of strikers was in the rear, filled with strikers and with it a small wagon laden with empty beer bottles. The police suspected that the bottles were intended as missiles and compelled the driver of the wagon to turn back.

At Wilson avenue and Euclid avenue a railroad train blocked the way and an effort was made to drive the van through the guard of police. The officers dragged to the ground the driver, Fred W. Mason, and the man on the seat beside him. These men resisted, and the police used their clubs on them with such effect that their heads were swollen masses of cuts.

O'Neill's ankle was broken. The strikers in the van jumped out and the police charged the crowd, using their clubs on all the heads within their grasp. Frank Coopenheker, a machinist, returning from work and not a striker, was caught in the crowd and severely clubbed. He was taken to the hospital and locked up. The strikers dispersed before the onslaught of the police and the non-union men were sent home.

Meanwhile a tragedy had taken place at the Brown works. Albert G. Saunders, a young student at the Case school of applied science, who has been working for the Brown company during vacation for the practical knowledge it would give him. He did not leave with the non-union men under police guard, and mounted his bicycle and sought to reach home alone. As he turned up Hamilton street, a knot of strikers saw him and shouted to him to stop. He did not obey and they began to throw stones and bricks at him. A brick struck him on the head and knocked him off his wheel and he claims that after he was down they continued to stone him. Rising to his knees he drew his revolver and fired. The ball missed his assailants, sped across the vacant lot and buried itself in the breast of Wm. Rettger, one of the strikers, who was walking through an alley with several companions. Rettger was sent to a hospital, where he died in a few minutes. He was a single man, 25 years old and a brother of pitcher Rettger of the Milwaukee baseball club.

Patrolman Gibbons heard the shot fired and rushed up, seized young Saunders and hurried him into the office of the Bishop-Babcock company.

In a short time a furious crowd which packed the streets surged against the front of the office, demanding that Saunders be delivered to them. Some one brought a rope and a cry of lynching was raised. They began to pry at the windows of the office, when Patrolman Gibbons, who was once a union workman, addressed the mob and partly quieted it. Two patrol wagon loads of police arrived and a guard was posted in front of the building.

Long before this, Mayor McKisson, Police Commissioner Abbot, Lieut. Col. Whitney of the 6th Regiment and others were gathered for consultation at City hall. Word of the critical condition of affairs was telephoned to them and a request made for militia. The mayor responded by ordering the Cleveland City Guards and Company F to the scene of the riot. The guards arrived first, just as the mob was preparing for another effort to capture Saunders. As the soldiers came down the street, the mob shrieked and howled, and the guards were compelled to open a way for themselves with leveled bayonets. Several men and boys were slightly wounded by the soldiers. The guards formed in front of the office, and just then Company F was seen coming. Amid a frenzy of excitement on the part of the crowd a patrol wagon was backed to the door of the office and Saunders was put into it and made to lie on the bottom. The guards formed around it with bayonets at "charge," and they forced their way down Hamilton street, part of the howling mob surging along with them. To heighten the excitement Detective Storer stood up in the patrol wagon and shot his revolver into the air. The wagon proceeded when the crowd in front had thinned, the guards opened ranks and the wagon sped on to the Central police station at a run. Saunders, whose head is badly cut up and his body a mass of bruises, is a prisoner, charged with the killing of Rettger. Company F, in command of Major Liebholt, halted his men, drew his revolver and declared that he would slightest attempt at violence he would give the command to fire. After that the noise ceased and the crowd scattered, and the company returned to quarters.

M'CREA NOT GUILTY.

Prindle of Arichat Discharged on the Charge of Murder.

(Special to the Sun.) Halifax, N. S., July 2.—The trial of M'Creia at Arichat, charged with the murder of Ebenezer Prindle, is finished. The deceased, according to the prosecution, went into M'Creia's house at The Points, West Bay, on Nov. 19th last and "killed" him. Prindle expired immediately. It appears that some person in the vicinity had been annoying M'Creia and he was under the impression he was going to be robbed on a certain night, so that he armed himself with a gun. The prosecution tried to prove that he deliberately shot down Prindle, who was nineteen years old, and a neighbor of M'Creia's. The trial took place before Judge Ritchie. His lordship's charge was against the prisoner, but the jury returned a verdict of not guilty. The judge remarked he was surprised at such a verdict after the evidence given. The accused was then discharged.

HARRIET BEECHER STOWE.

Hartford, Conn., July 2.—The closing chapter in the earthly career of Harriet Beecher Stowe was enacted at her late home this afternoon when, with the full Episcopal ritual, the funeral services were solemnized. Rev. Francis Goodwin officiated, assisted by Rev. Dr. Joseph Twitchell of the Asylum Congregational church, and Rev. Dr. Whitwell, associate pastor of Plymouth church, Brooklyn, also was present. In accordance with the official expressed wish of Mrs. Stowe, everything in connection with the funeral was devoid of ostentation, and instead of the customary crepe at the door, the only token of the presence of death was a wreath of white flowers on an ivory background. NEWFOUNDLAND.

The Captain of the Capulet Censured.—The Customs Revenue.

St. John's, N. F., July 2.—The marine court of inquiry on the loss of the Capulet has censured the captain, but permitted him to retain his certificate. The customs revenue of the colony for the quarter ending June 30, was \$400,000, against \$322,000 for the same quarter last year, but only an average when compared with returns for similar periods in the past five years.

GROSS CARELESSNESS.

Boston, July 2.—Three colored men named Joseph Dunham, 33, John Clark, 33, and George Willis, 68 years old, are held at the Lagrange street station on a charge of manslaughter. The men were moving furniture at 27 Elliott street this afternoon, and in lowering a bureau from the second story window a rope gave way, allowing the bureau to fall in the street below. It struck Edna Collins, a Carver street girl, 11 years old, causing a fracture of the skull, from which she died this evening. The police will attempt to show that the men were guilty of gross carelessness.
