**LOCAL NEWS.**

No slides have occurred on Union street, West End for nearly a week.

Invitations have been issued for a dance to be held at Westfield tomorrow evening. It will be the first of the season, and a large number, it is expected, will attend.

Mrs. Barbour, Miss Barbour and Mr. Fred Barbour sailed from Liverpool today for Quebec on the Empress of Britain after a trip of several months in Europe.

A meeting of the executive of the Canadian Club will be held at five o'clock this evening in the Times office.

The death occurred this morning of John Fletcher Myles, second son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew J. Myles. Deceased was one year and seven months of age. The funeral will take place on Sunday at 2.30 o'clock.

Michael Gulla, a laborer, had a narrow escape from death at noon today when he swallowed a bone and was choking when Mr. Wallace rendered him assistance. He afterwards placed him on board his team and drove him home.

John Francis Harrington, eldest son of John and Mary Harrington, died at three o'clock this morning at his parents' residence, 15 Long Wharf. Besides his parents, six sisters and one brother survive. The propeller of the S. S. Calvin Austin was yesterday and Eastport one of the crew attempted to cut away the rope. He was unsuccessful, so when the vessel arrived in port last night driver Lehey went down and cleared the propeller.

The steamer Yale arrived from Boston at eight o'clock this morning. She brought 108 passengers. A large number of passengers took the I. C. R. to Pt. du Chene and Nova Scotia towns. The tourist travel to Prince Edward Island has been heavier than ever this year, the majority of travellers having relatives on the island.

A very sudden and unexpected death took place in Oliville, Queens County, on Saturday last, when Mrs. George Lourie, daughter of the late William Tilley, schoolmaster for over thirty years in that locality, passed away, leaving a gloom over the whole village. Mrs. Lourie was in the thirty-third year of her age, and leaves a husband and three small children. Four sisters—Mrs. J. Thompson, Mrs. Levi White, Estella and Olive, all of West Avon, Conn., and four brothers, William, Alexander, Crawford and Lemuel Tilley, survive. Mrs. Lourie, who was greatly esteemed for her many admirable traits, was interred in Lyon's cemetery, Armstrong's Corner, on Tuesday of this week, the obsequies being largely attended.

A woman by the name of Mrs. Corrigan made things lively on Mill St. this morning. She appeared in a costume most appropriate to the day and had several yards of orange ribbon in her hands. Mrs. Corrigan had been imbibing too freely, and as the procession of Orangemen went by, she became too enthusiastic in the celebration of the "24th" and was arrested. She did not go to Central station without resistance, but put up a stiff fight with the policeman. A warrant was secured and Mrs. Corrigan was conveyed to jail in it.

Mr. and Mrs. Seelye were married at Weymouth, N. S., on July 13, 1857.

There are nine children living, namely: Gilbert Y., residing in China; James D., of this city; J. Oliver, of Montana; Douglas B., of Montreal; Mrs. Morris Doane of Chicago; Mrs. Frederic W. Stevens of New York; Misses C. Elizabeth, Helen M., and Gertrude T., of this city. There are three grandchildren, two daughters of Mrs. Doane and one daughter of Mrs. Stevens.

Mrs. Seelye is the daughter of the late John Oliver Vail of Sussex Vale, and afterwards of Weymouth, N. S. Mr. Seelye, who is eighty-one years old, was born in St. George, N. B., on July 17, 1828. He was in business in Weymouth for a number of years, coming to this city in the early fifties. He has since that time been engaged in business here as a ship's broker.

Mr. Seelye enjoys perfect health and daily takes his swim in the surf at Bay Shore.

Mrs. George Morriss, of this city, is sister of Mr. Seelye, and is now in her eighty-seventh year.

The reception to Mr. and Mrs. Seelye will be attended by relatives, many of whom have come from considerable distances to join in making the golden wedding a memorable success.

**BELGIAN OFFICER EXPOSES CONDITIONS IN THE CONGO**  
 Soldiers, He Asserts, are Brigands Who Prey Upon the Natives—He Had Been Charged With Cruelty.

BRUSSELS, July 12.—Major Lemair, who served 18 years in the Congo, and who resigned when he was notified he would be prosecuted for cruelty toward the native soldiery, retailed by publishing a sensational exposure of the revolting conditions prevailing in the native army. He declares the soldiers are merely brigands who raid the population, assault the women and burn villages. The major adds that when he attempted to protect the natives by inflicting severe punishments on the troops his disciplinary measures were over-ruled by his superiors. He insists that the real object of the Congo administration in preferring the charges was to get rid of him.
