

FIFTH CONVENTION FRENCH ACADIANS.

Large Attendance at Carquet Proceedings.

Many Prominent Men Are Present—

Some Able Speeches Delivered

—Weather Delightful.

(Special to the Sun.) MONCTON, N. B., Aug. 15.—The fifth convention of the French Acadians of the maritime provinces opened at Carquet today with a large attendance. The weather was everything that could be desired in a most agreeable manner. Among the prominent men present are Mr. Lemieux, representing Premier Laurier, and Messrs. Monk and Turgeon from Quebec, J. B. Breaux, of Louisiana; Judge, Senator Forier, Mgr. Richard, Hon. O. J. Leblanc, M. P.; Hon. C. H. LaBelle, minister of public works, New Brunswick; Hon. A. D. Richard, O. M. Melanson, Dr. B. T. Gaudet, Dr. A. F. Landry, and most of the French Acadian clergy and leading professional and business men in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and P. E. Island.

About four thousand people were present. The celebration began by solemn high mass in open air. Monsignor Richard, celebrant; Rev. A. D. Cormier and P. F. J. L. White of Grand Falls in Difficulty. Put \$4,000 in Cold Cash and All His Furniture into "Elijah" Sandford's "Kingdom."

LISBON FALLS, Me., Aug. 15.—J. L. White of Grand Falls, N. B., a prosperous merchant of that town, is here to take home his father, who, with his wife, have left Shiloh. The story is that White, who is a feeble old man of 70 years of age, is a well-to-do farmer at Tracy's Mills, near Woodstock, N. B. He was a deeply religious man of mind, and had been a zealous worker in the Baptist church and one of its deacons for years. Everything went along well until the Shiloh missionaries invaded the quiet neighborhood, seemingly determined on securing as converts those who owned some property.
