SOME WEDS THAT
MAKE GOOD SALADS.

As for salad weds there seems to be no end of them, and one need not spend a cent for salad if one lives in the country or suburbs, for the back- yard and vacant lot will furnish an abundance of tender things for the gathering.

One of the "new" common weeds now being used very extensively for salad is sorrel, or "sorrel grass," as children call it. This may be eaten by itself as a salad, or mixed with other greens and things. It is a little too sour by itself, but if mixed with the vinegar or lemon from the salad dressing.

An old herb, the common yarrow, is now used as a most wholesome salad plant. It is sometimes called "wild pepper," and is a very delicious and novel-flavored dish, but as a tonic and stimulant as well, it is excellent for children, and a wonderful spring medicine. Only the very young and very tender first shoots should be used for it becomes entirely too bitter to eat when it matures. It is well to mix the leaves with other green salad leaves as it is so strong.

A salad made of the tender young leaves of the red clover and some of its blossoms is very new and delicious, as well as particularly nutritious, as the clover is one of the richest of all nutritious plants, and nitrogen is one of the most strengthening ele- ments, especially when taken into the system unrefined. The leaves will be found to be strongly peppery so that they almost burn the throat and tongue after a number have been eaten. They should be very thoroughly masticated.

In making the salad the clover blossoms are pulled apart and only the colored part used. The flavor of the flowers is most delicate.
