beaten by straight baseball, but
sneaked that the games were "fixed".

influential members of the Frederic-
ton team to drop certain games for
the benefit of the betters.

NATIONAL LEAGUE
MEETING

New York, N. Y., Dec. 9.—The claim
of Roger Bresnahan against the St.
Louis club for alleged breach of con-
tract, probably will be settled by an
arbitration commission in St. Louis.
This was the tentative decision of the
board of directors of the National
league at its meeting here today. Bres-
nahan and his attorneys appeared be-
fore the board and presented the
claim. The St. Louis club was repre-
sented by President James C. Jakes,
who also is an attorney. After listen-
ing to the arguments for and against
Bresnahan's claim for four years' salary,
the board suggested some sort of
peaceful settlement and the attorneys
retired for an hour to discuss terms.
On their return the tentative arbitra-
tion plan was broached and received
the sanction of the directors.

The directors officially awarded the
pennant for the 1912 season to the
New York Giants.

The claim of Umpire Charles Rigler
to \$2,500 against the Philadelphia club
for services in signing Pitcher Rixey
gave the directors an opportunity to
set on record as opposed to umpires
acting as scouts for club managers
in securing players.

With the exception of John P. Mc-
Gray, every manager is in the city
for a league meeting tomorrow, and
several trades for players are expected
to be made.

McFARLAND REFUSES OFFER.

New York, Dec. 9.—According to

weight, has refused an offer of \$5,000
