CLOSING COTTON LETTER FROM JUDSON & CO.

New York, June 16.—There was little fresh of importance today and the cotton market continued to reflect a bullish average of sentiment. There was no excitement in the July option; in fact the new crop months were relatively stronger. The Times-Democrat report was so nearly in line with previous private reports that it furnished no surprise, but it tended to confirm other estimates of only a slight increase in acreage as well as recent complaints of backward conditions in many sections of the belt. General sentiment seems to have undergone a pronounced change on the question of cotton values and the current strength appears to reflect a belief that cotton is not high at these prices, rather than any specific news development or technical condition. 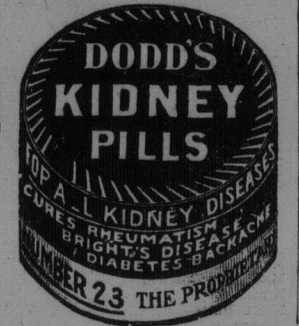

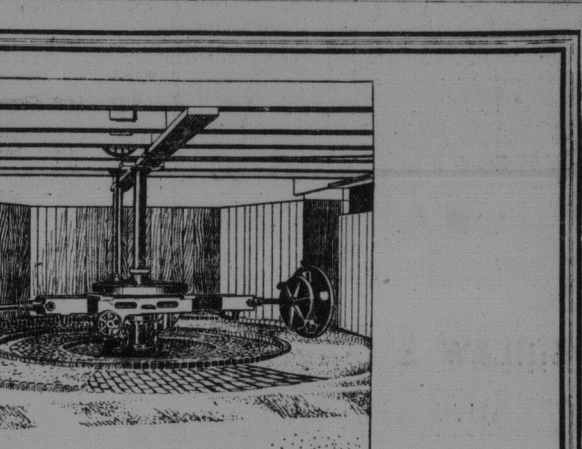

NEWS SUMMARY AFFECTING MARKET

(F. B. McCURDY & CO.)
New York, June 16.—The failure of the subscription to the German and Prussian loans made a bad impression on the Berlin money market. Stock market conditions, however, in Berlin and London improve with the better prospect of peace between Bulgaria and Serbia. The highly favorable bank statement on Saturday supplies proof the present banking situation does not call for a resort to the emergency currency which the secretary of the treasury is willing to issue. Important rate decisions by the Supreme Court are expected today. It is reported that announcement of the acceptance of the Union Pacific dissolution plan may be made today. The Penna may buy all of the Union Pacific holdings of Southern Pacific stock. Information channels are friendly to purchases on reactions. European copper statistics are due today.
Trading movements governed by the improved general outlook and the immediate developments of financial importance may be seen today.
Union and Southern Pacific are controlled largely by the dissolution developments. Great Northern and Northern Pacific insiders are reported to take a cheerful view. Investors buy St. Paul, Atchafalaya, Mop, R. M. K. & T. and Southern Railway on crop conditions. C. P. R. and A. C. P. find good absorption.

The "Paving Determinator's" Verdict.

THE "Paving Determinator" is an ingenious machine that was built by the department of Public Works of Detroit—to subject sample stretches of various street pavements to severe, actual-service tests. It imitates heavy trucks and steel-shod draught horses, reproducing, in faithful detail, every effect of this kind of traffic. This remarkable machine was recently used to test five varieties of street pavement—covering practically the entire range of present-day road coverings.
A report of the test says:

"When the test had been made under the direction of Mr. McCabe and officials of the department, on eight sections of pavement laid in a circular track, the concrete section, laid under the specifications of the Board of County Road Commissioners of Wayne County, Michigan, showed by far the best resistance to the severe test to which the pavements were put."
