SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in the Northwest Territories, or in the Dominion Lands, or in the Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Land Office (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. Homestead may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 10 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homestead in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$10.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after a quarter-section patent also 10 acres; extra cultivation, pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.
