IS DROWNED WHILE IN HIS CANOE

Kingsclear Indian Carried Cargo of Firewater and Collapsed on St. John River.

Fredericton, Sept. 16.—Louis Paul, an Indian of the Kingsclear reserve, was found drowned about 11.30 o'clock this morning just above Springhill. Charles Gallop noticed a canoe at a sand bar and when he went over to investigate he found Paul with his head and shoulders over the side of the canoe in the water and his feet caught under the bar of the canoe. He had been to the city on Saturday and in the canoe were found a bag of flour, a large supply of provisions, rifle and cartridges, one empty flask and two long necks full of whiskey. It is presumed the man became so intoxicated that he toppled over and his feet being caught under the bar kept him from falling out and the heavy load of provisions kept the boat from capsizing. The body was taken to the shore and the chief of police and Sheriff Hawthorne were summoned. They called Dr. Ross, the coroner, who deemed an inquest unnecessary as there were no bruises on the body.



MOBILIZATION FOR A FORWARD MOVEMENT OF NOVA SCOTIA METHODISM

Halifax, Sept. 14.—The Nova Scotia conference of the Methodist church is launching a great forward move-
ment in connection with every depart-
ment of the church's activity. Rev. A. C. Borden, D. D., president of the
conference, Rev. W. H. Hearty, D. D.,
Watson, of Mount Allison University
were in Halifax during the week-end
meeting ministers and lay delegates
of the city Churches and Dartmouth,
together with delegates from several
of the outlying circuits.

President A. C. Borden delivered
two addresses in the Brunswick St.
Church marked with intense spirital
fervour. The keynote of his mes-
sage was as follows:—"War conditions
have thrust upon us the consideration
of our opportunities and obligations.
We must define and pursue a policy
worthy of our high traditions as a
church and adequate to the demands
of the time."

Rev. W. H. Hearty, D. D., urged im-
mediate and complete mobilization for
a forward movement. Never was the
need of concentration, devotion and
active Christian service so great, so
imperative as now. Large tasks are
ahead—Divine equipment is needed.
Ministers, officials and members were
urged to fall into line for an aggres-
sive campaign this fall and winter
for the furtherance of the cause of
Christ. An increase of 20 per cent.
to church membership is one of the ob-
jectives to be achieved this year.
Methodism is to take an advanced
place on all questions relating to the
application of the Gospel to the
economic, social, political and moral
affairs of life. President Borden and
Dr. Hearty are touring one end of
the province to the other, visiting the
various Methodist districts seeking to
enthusiasm and mobilize the churches for
the accomplishment of this new for-
ward movement.
