Show Good Year

Fourth Annual Meeting Held
Last Evening — \$1,689.49
Given Away as Donations
— Society Has Lived up to
Its Name—Miss A.L. Brock
Re-elected President.

The danger of "demobilizing patriotism" was referred to in the splendid report of the year's work given before members of the Y. W. P. A. at their annual meeting held in the U. W. V. A. rooms last evening. Previous to the meeting the officers of 1919 had supper at the Green Lantern.

Miss A. L. Brock presided and the nomination report was presented by Miss Louise Sheldon.

The Secretary, Miss Madeleine deSoyres in her report stated that 15 general, 14 executive and 2 special meetings have been held. It was decided to adopt a fee of membership and there are now 150 members enrolled. Regret was expressed at the seasonal from the city of the former president Miss Jessie Church and Miss Helen Church, a valued member.

Resignations from the executive included Misses Dione, Climo, Cruikshank, MacNeil and Compton. The Y. W. P. A. is fortunate in having Miss A. L. Brock as president who has not spared herself in furthering the work of the association.

Among the outstanding features of the year's work are the following: Ushering at the Imperial Theatre. This work has gone on unceasingly and is our chief source of revenue.

Receipts for the year being \$132. Members have carried on this arduous work under the patronage of Misses Dodge, Dixon and Sheldon, to whom, as well as the ushers, is due great praise for their untiring devotion.

The opening of the season at the Seamen's Institute was inaugurated by an entertainment given on November 20th. Each evening there is a corps of volunteers at the canteen, under the patronage of Miss Usham. Assistance of a similar nature was rendered at the Red Triangle canteen until its close last spring.

Another important activity is that of our hospital committee, who pay weekly visits to the East St. John County Hospital, and provide any delicacies needed in the soldiers' ward. This work included the decorating of the ward at Christmas, and the sending of many additional gifts, such as photograph records, books, etc.

In February last the association sold tickets for a play staged by Mr. George Price, which cleared \$168 for the Veterans. We also sold tickets, programmes and candy at the Imperial on February 13th, realizing \$64.92 for the Veterans. On February 20th members undertook street canvassing for the Thrift Stamp campaign, and \$1,000 of our own funds was invested in this way towards our Soldiers' Memorial. \$2,236.00 was realized by Thrift Stamp sales.

In April the associates undertook the catering for the Ypres anniversary dinner at the Armoury, and also the Vimy Ridge Tag Day in aid of the Veterans, on which we collected \$2,500 exclusive of expenses.

Other activities included waiting on returned soldiers at the Armoury, meeting dependents at the port, and serving sandwiches for the Commercial.

Miss deSoyres, who is retiring from office, was presented with a hearty vote of thanks and a bouquet of flowers. Miss Short and Miss Dodge were also thanked for good work. Excellent reports on the ushering, the Seamen's Institute canteen, entertainments, East St. John Hospital work and Thrift Stamp Committee were given by Misses Dodge, Upham, deSoyres, Farwell and Marion Irvine.

Miss Brock announced that it had been decided to give up the ushering at the Imperial Theatre, February 7th. Letters of thanks were read from Miss Agnes Warner and the Lancaster Hospital officials, and an appeal from the Playgrounds Association. Twenty-five dollars was voted to the Boys' Club, and a committee authorized to assist three needy families. The next meeting will have as speakers Dr. Farris and Mrs. M. B. Edwards on Anti-Tuberculosis work.

Miss F. Alward—Secretary. Miss Helen Short—Treasurer. Miss Collins—Standard-bearer. Misses W. Upham, A. Hatch, B. Frick, M. Dixon, M. deSoyres, B. Boyer, S. Allingham, G. Kilen, Marion Irvine, M. Bolton, executive.

Travellers' Soldiers' entertainment, selling Prince of Wales badges on the streets, catering to upwards of 100 soldiers at the G. W. V. A. on August 15th; assisting at the G. W. V. A. fair where the booths netted nearly \$700.00, holding a rummage sale, catering for the R. C. Artillery dance; sending books to an invalid soldier; giving concerts in several institutions; selling Victory bonds; providing Christmas cheer and necessities for nine needy families, and furnishing tea and cake for the G. W. V. A. treat at Christmas time.

We were fortunate in being addressed by Miss Agnes Warner, Mrs. Lawrence, Mrs. Hooper, Miss Matheson, Miss Bell of Rothesay, and Capt. Pierce of the Y. M. C. A.

Many testimonials of appreciation have been received. We greatly prize the gift of the ebony savel from the St. George's Society, and also the selection of our president to act as judge of the Soldiers' Day Parade. A young English sailor wrote enclosing a one pound note, to express his appreciation of the kindness shown him by the Y. W. P. A. during his stay in St. John.

Special mention should be made of the splendid help of our friends at the Old Ladies' Home in knitting socks for the sailors, which were distributed at the annual treat on December 26th. Over 200 pairs were knitted.

Throughout the years of war our members have learned, through work, the meaning of real fellowship, and the value of qualities of character which far transcend social attainments or petty distinctions. Henceforward their efforts will be directed towards community service, both at home and elsewhere.
