

DECEMBER WHEAT HITS NEW HIGH WITH MAY GOOD

December Rate Was \$201 1/4 and May Touched \$1.63 But Offerings Scarce.

Winnipeg, Dec. 23.—Considerable advances were made on the local wheat market today. After opening strong the undercurrent continued very through- out the session and a few reactions were made.

December wheat went up to \$2.61 1/4, the high for the day, while May wheat touched \$1.63, indicating that there is still a big short interest in the present month. The offerings are very scarce. Futures closed 5 1/4 to 5 1/4 higher. There was a strong demand for cash wheat by shippers and exporters at unchanged premiums. Cash grain remained dull and featureless. Oats, closed 5-4 to 1 cent high.

Protectionist Charged With Vagrancy—Shoplifter Al- lowed to Go.

James Jones and William Jackson, who passed Wednesday night in the police station as protectionists, were charged yesterday afternoon with va- grancy and not being able to give a satisfactory account of themselves. Further charges may follow. Jones gave his residence as St. John and Jackson stated he was a native of England but had been living in St. John for two years. Both men were remand- ed over the holiday.

Three drunks were before the court two of them were allowed their liberty in order to secure their fines. Five prisoners were remanded to jail over the holiday.

Alfred Black, charged with stealing a bottle of cedar oil valued at fifteen cents, from a store in King street, pleaded guilty in the police court to- day and was remanded. Inquiries are being made as to her character. She was given in charge by Maude Reid and Gladys Dowling of Halifax, who are employed as floor walkers by St. John merchants. Is McO. Ritchie acted for the defence.

The woman was allowed to go later by the Magistrate, as the Woolworth people did not press the charge.

Area Evans admitted taking papers from a doorway on several occasions between December 10 and 20. Let go, Margaret Wayman, a young girl, charged with wandering around at one yesterday morning and not giving a satisfactory account of herself was re- manded for investigation. On leaving the court-room she collapsed and had to be carried downstairs.

Mrs. Dora Harrowitz was charged with having liquor on her premises on Long Wharf, illegally, on December 20. Inspector Crawford told of going to her house with Inspectors Hender- son and Tower and an entering saw the dealer. She was taken to the de- pot and saw her go into a back room. They followed and saw her drop a bot- tle into a saucepan. The bottle con- tained a liquid resembling gin. Ac- cused said it was used to rub on her hands. It was corroborated by In- spectors Tower and Henderson. G. A. Henderson, police clerk, said that de- fendant had been in court recently on a similar charge. Inspector Journey told of inspecting the premises when the other charge was laid. Adjourned till Tuesday morning. J. A. Barry ap- peared for the defence and W. M. Ryan for the prosecution.

The magistrate said that on account of the excellent character of his daughter he was disposed to be leni- ent. Accused promised to stop drink- ing and was allowed to go. S. B. Bus- tin for the defence.

Empress of France In From Liverpool

Big C. P. O. S. Liner Brought 1,464 Passengers, 1,620 Tons Cargo and Mail.

The C. P. O. S. liner Empress of France docked yesterday morning at 7.30 after a favorable and unevent- ful trip from Liverpool, consuming five days. The ship carried 1,463 passengers, 6,220 bags of mail and 1,620 tons of general cargo.

First Trip This Season.

This is the first trip of the Empress to St. John this season. The ship is officered as follows: E. Cook, R. N. R. commander; H. Sibbald, ship cap- tain; D. J. Jones, chief officer; G. A. Viner, chief engineer; P. G. Thaw, purser; Dr. C. Ward, surgeon; F. C. Hester, chief steward.

Officer Jones reported a pleas- ant passage across, nothing happen- ing to mar the trip. The weather, for this season of the year, was all that could be desired, the passengers suffering none of the ill effects that some seas accompany a sea- son's voyage.

Brought 1,464 Passengers.

There were 117 first class, 307 sec- ond class and 1,039 third class pas- sengers aboard. After the liner docked the immigration officer got busy, inspecting aboard ship the 1st and 2nd class cabin passengers. Later the steerage passengers were taken to the immigration shed where they were put through a rigid examination.

Special Trains.

The C. P. R. R. despatched four spe- cial trains with boat passengers. The two first getting away at 12.50 and 1.50 p. m., carried cabin and steerage passengers, the first for Toronto and the second for Montreal and Western Canada. Steerage passengers were dispatched on specials leaving at 5.10 and 6.30 p. m. A special train with mails was also sent out.

Come Notables.

Among the notables on board were: The Rt. Hon. The Countess of Minto, who came to Canada to attend the wed- ding of her son, the Earl of Minto, which will take place in Montreal in the near future; Major General J. Lyons Bigger, V. D. C. M. G., who is en route to Ottawa; Dr. S. Levin, a poet, who is here on a visit from London; Hon. R. Ryder, of London; E. T. Steno, B. S. C. F. C. S., of Brant- ford, Ont.; and Lady M. Scott, of London, who is en route to Ottawa, and Alexander Graham Bell, inventor of the telephone.
