Lady Harvey Was The Honored Guest

Lines of Activities for Women's Canadian Clubs Pointed Out in Address.

Various lines of activities which might be taken up by Women's Canadian Clubs, were pointed out by Lady Harvey in an earnest well delivered address made before members of the Women's Canadian Club yesterday. The occasion was a luncheon, one of the pleasantest affairs of the season, given at the Royal Hotel in honor of Lady Harvey, Miss Harvey, Miss Marie Linden and Miss Mary Gray who were also guests. Mrs. Leonard Tilley, president of the club, presided and members of the executive were seated at the head table. The club members occupied smaller tables. The dainty decorations were pink and yellow snap dragon.

After a delicious luncheon had been served, Mrs. Tilley in introducing Lady Harvey and welcoming the other members of the company, said that it was one of the privileges of Canadian Clubs to entertain distinguished visitors and to be able to meet strangers as friends.

Lady Harvey.

Lady Harvey thanked those present for their hospitality, and in the name of herself and her friends spoke of her pleasure in the warm welcome accorded them in St. John. All across Canada she had been entertained by Canadian Clubs and by the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire. They had had a royal welcome. She wished there was such an institution as Canadian Clubs in the Mother Country. It was not only an entertaining organization but clubs which could do wonderful work for their own cities.

Lady Harvey said she knew of the work done by Canadian women, their powers of organization and their heroic endurance. Now was not the time to slacken effort but to keep in mind what the future held in its resultant conditions. It is not only the disabled men we must think of, she said, but the mental condition of the returned men. You must not expect of anyone else. He has endured hell for years and seen sights which can never leave him the same. The biggest fight now is to try to get back to normal. We need all workers for that, all the love for King, Country and Flag that the British Empire can get together.

Understand the Soldiers.

Teach your own men to understand the soldiers. Lady Harvey urged, it needs the infinite love, patience and understanding of women to get over this difficult time of readjustment. There is discontent all over the world and men fall a prey to agitators unless they are understood and cared for. They need the love the mothers, sisters and wives can give, women helping them as they helped them in the trenches. They need protection in the unemployment problem and other troubles of the reconstruction period.

Train children in schools never to forget, for a moment, what the soldiers saved the hearts of Canada for us from the sacrifice of the soldiers.

Teach the young people of Canada to play the game, to be fair in little things and in big things. Let them have a real understanding of the price and the glory of the war. Tell them of the breaking of the Hindenburg line, of the second battle of Ypres and of Vimy Ridge.

Put into their hearts a love of all things beautiful; nature, books, plays and animals. The necessity of teaching kindness to animals, Lady Harvey said, had been impressed upon her by some sights she had witnessed in Canada. That might be a work to be taken up by the Women's Canadian Club; the instruction of care for sick and helpless things and protection for animals.

A Good Suggestion.

Another suggestion made by the speaker, in a very tactful way, was that while in St. John we have a city beautifully situated amid the beauty, there are dirty back yards and rubbish heaps which disfigure the landscape. Lady Harvey suggested prizes being offered for clean yards, awards for flowers grown in small plots and many other practical ways of inducing a love of beauty and tidiness in the minds of people. How, she asked, can you expect children to grow up clean and tidy if they are surrounded with disorder and rubbish in a dirty back yard? The same conditions prevailed in England and great improvement had been made when people realized that disorder was unnecessary. The speaker said that she hoped her hearers would remember in referring to what she had seen on a drive through the city on Monday, she only did so because it was so sad to see beauty spoiled. She only wished she could say in St. John, and she would be only too glad to help in this work of cleaning up, which she felt sure the women of St. John could accomplish.

She felt she could say things with out being misunderstood, as we were all British and all could speak together to make Canada beautiful.


In closing she thanked the people of the city for their kindness, and said she thought she would start a Canadian Club over here.

The Club Honored.

Mrs. John H. Thomson, in thanking Lady Harvey for her fine address, said there are many things we can learn and that she hoped sincerely Sir Martin and Lady Harvey will return to St. John. The Club had been honored in many ways and at this time the last meeting of the season, it seemed as if the club had gone from better to best. The members of the company were then thanked by Mrs. Thomson for the pleasure they had given.

Mrs. Tilley then told those present that the decoration worn by Lady Harvey was a British Red Cross emblem, set with diamonds and rubies which had been presented to her by some returned men as a token of their appreciation of what she had done for the soldiers. Lady Harvey is not as yet demobilized but is still carrying on her work for those who served in the great war, and has been able to accomplish a great deal to give help and comfort to soldiers and nursing sisters.

She can be assured of a warm place in the hearts of Canada for her interest in those who served the Empire.

Scientists Honor Madame Curie

Carnegie Hall to be Scene of Great Demonstration This Afternoon.

New York, May 17.—Canadian universities will be prominently represented at the reception to be tendered to Madame Marie Curie, co-discoverer of radium, at Carnegie Hall tomorrow afternoon. The reception has been arranged for the university women graduates of United States colleges and officials of the Federation of University Women of Canada have arranged to occupy a box which will be appropriately decorated with the Canadian flag and the banners of the various Canadian universities represented. The committee in charge has planned to include among those occupying the seats women graduates from every university in the Dominion.

Madam Curie Feted.

Madam Curie was feted as the "Queen of the Scientists of the world" at a luncheon given in her honor today by four United States scientific societies. Tonight she attended a reception held by the New York Academy of Sciences at the American Museum of Natural History.

Dr. Richard B. Moore, chief chemist of the United States bureau of mines, one of the speakers at the luncheon, said it was generally understood in science that uranium was the mother element of radium but that Madame Curie was the real mother.

The Difficulties.

Explaining that it required reduction of 600 tons of ore, treated by sixty tons of chemicals, to produce one-tenth as much radium as the gram which the women of the United States will present to her next week, Dr. Moore declared:

"That is what Madame Curie had to go through to give radium to the world."

Beyond thanking her hosts for the reception the frail scientist made no remarks. It was explained that she was very much fatigued from social excursions since she arrived in this country. Her right arm was bandaged; the result of effusive handshaking.
