
KRUGER WILL NOT BE RECONCILED. nterview With Boer Ge erals Was a Stormy

Utrecht, Holland, Aug. 22—The conference of the Boer generals and civic revresentatives with Mr. Kruger Wednesday lasted for three hours and is said to have been stormy. At the end of an hour and a half the delegates withdrew, leaving Botha, DeWet and Delarey with Kruger. It is understood the generals found Kruger in no way inclined to acquiesce to British dominion in South Africa, and still clinging to the idea of a united South Africa under the Boer flag. Kruger is even said to have bitterly upbraided the generals for giving up Boer independence. The generals returned to The Hague.
