- A. No, I could not. I think the building ! centre of the lot.
- Q. You spoke of some cultivation, a small piece con which side was that cultivated?
- A. Just where the house was.
- Q. You don't know which side that was on. Was the clearing on the part sold to Porter or on the part sold to McPherson?
- A. I could not tell you. I don't know. There is a kind of a little point higher ground, and there is a slough comes in and they don't build here, they are building away back, the building was on this point and the improvements was there.
- Q. There was a house there at the time of the transfer?
- A. At the time of the transfer,
- Q. Was it occupied? A. A little while after treaty it was an old building you see and they pulled it down.
- Q. Who occupied it? A. Just Mrs. Rat.
- Q. At the time of the treaty did anyone occupy it?
- A. Nobody at the time of the treaty.
- Q. Then a year before the treaty who occupied it?
- A. Mrs. Rat.
- Q. A year before the treaty Mrs. Rat occupied it?
- A. Several years before the transfer, I could not say hardly, the survey was made a long while after the treaty.

Adjourned until to-morrow morning at eleven o'clock June 6,1907, when resumed as follows- (Continuation of evidence regarding claims Nos. 46 and 47.)
