

Statement of ARTHUR E. BARNES,
Major, Retired, United States Army.

Re: Case No. 100-444444

I am a past owner of the late New York Star. No 1 Captain BARNES,
is correct. I am now in the service, after my return from the front
and when I got a hit in my back, I was grasped by the waist. I was intended
to run but to escape help, but at that moment one of three soldiers fired a
revolver, which he pointed at me. At that time I succeeded in getting away and
ran upstairs. When I came downstairs again, 20 minutes later, I noticed that
there was no one away there, and that two bottles of what was known as
cider had disappeared. If I saw the three soldiers again, I am not certain I
could recognize them, except the soldier with the revolver. I recognized him
of the three soldiers.
