On one side of the coin is St. George and the dragon and on the other side is stamped the horn of Plenty. Chief of Police John Holmes remembers when he was a young man these coins used to be all the go, but he has not seen one in years. At that time there was the Upper Canada cent and the Bank of Montreal cent. This latter had a picture of the Bank of Montreal stamped on it. These are also getting to be a very rare coin. Mr. Simmons is quite proud of his find, and will keep the coin as a pocket piece.

WANT MORE MONEY

A deputation composed of A. J. Dolson, S. L. Wellwood, John Houston, F. Sutor, A. Langstaff, Wm. McGeechie, Jos. M. Smith, W. W. Everitt and John Clements will wait upon the County Council on Wednesday next in the interests of the Agricultural Society. Heretofore the Peninsular Fair has received a bonus of only \$50 from the County. The surrounding counties all get more—Essex receiving \$900, Lambton \$400, and some counties, such as Carleton, receiving as high as \$600. The Agricultural Society feels that it should receive more aid from the county, especially this year when they are making an attempt to decrease their mortgage. Secretary Robinson promises that, if assured of support, the directors will materially increase the prize list in order to induce more farmers to display. The prospects for this season's fair are of the brightest.
