away, and leave their old stand vacant. The bees will go back and find no hive. Many will die. Some may make their way into other hives. These may do a little work on buckwheat, but their lives at most will be short. You say that queen No. 3 is laying, as well as the workers. It would be a pity to lose her. Perhaps she might replace an old queen. If you do not need her for this, let her work out her own salvation after shaking. Where bees are found queenless a frame of brood should be given them at onceregardless of whatever plan you may adopt to give them a queen. The presence of brood will prevent the development of laying workers. The bees will remain peaceful-you may then let them raise a queen, or give them a ripe cell, or introduce a laying queen. Never leave a hive without brood.-Ed.]
