THE AUGUST BANK STATEMENT

The effects of war upon banking conditions in Canada is shown in the August Bank Statement.

The first important change noted is an increase of nearly \$16,000,000 in note circulation brought about by the Government's emergency circulation clause. Demand deposits as compared with July fell off \$8,000,000 while deposits after notice declined \$12,000,000. There has been a gain of \$15,000,000 in specie and a gain of \$3,000,000 in Dominion Notes.

Call Leans outside Canada dropped off from \$125,000,000 to \$96,000,000, while current loans in Canada decreased nearly \$4,000,000.
