

THE AUGUST BANK STATEMENT

The effects of war upon banking conditions in Canada is shown in the August Bank Statement. The first important change noted is an increase of nearly \$16,000,000 in note circulation brought about by the Government's emergency circulation clause.

Call Loans outside Canada dropped off from \$125,000,000 to \$96,000,000, while current loans in Canada decreased nearly \$4,000,000.

NEWS OF WORLD TOLD IN BRIEF

Sir Edward Carson Will Not Forget to Fight Home Rule After The War

RUSSIAN BANKS GENEROUS Give \$1,000,000 to Czar for Relief Fund—2,000,000 Unemployed in Germany for Lack of Raw Material—Dardanelles Closed.

Sir Edward H. Carson, leader of the Irish Unionist party, outlined the Ulster programme of the future, in addressing the Unionist Council.

The Dardanelles have been closed to navigation, according to a despatch from Constantinople to Reuters Telegram Company.

A report received at Geneva from Munich estimates that 2,000,000 men and women are idle in Germany, and that the number of unemployed is increasing daily.

"It is officially announced that the French forces in Equatorial Africa have reoccupied the greater part of the Congo territory ceded to Germany by the treaty of 1911."

The Russian Emperor on Monday received representatives of the Petrograd banks who placed at his disposal a million rubles (550,000), for the necessities of war, and a million rubles for the organization of a hospital service and to aid the families of soldiers.

A despatch from Rome to the Exchange Telegraph Company says that a message from Budapest asserts that the Minister of the Interior has announced that fifteen new cases of cholera were discovered in the city's military hospital Monday morning.

GREEK GOVERNMENT BUGS GRAIN, etc. Chicago, September 29.—Kansas City says agents of the Greek Government have placed \$2,000,000 worth of orders for grain, flour, hay, horses, tents, leather goods, etc., and will similarly spend \$8,000,000 more for prompt shipment, via Gulf.

BRITISH ORDERS COMING TO DOMINION STEEL PLANT

May Result in Reopening of Mills That Have Been Closed—Going After New Orders from Old Country.

(Special Correspondence.) Sydney, N.S., September 29.—Indications point to a speedy resumption of operations of some of the mills of the Dominion Steel Works, Mr. J. H. Plummer, the president, said regarding the number of men now on the plant: "We have mentioned the number of men to be employed as about 1,000. As a matter of fact, it has been larger, owing to some extra work which we have undertaken. In the second half of August we had on our payroll 2,116, who earned among them a daily average of 1,306 full days pay; that is, the daily force averaged 1,306 men, but the work was divided among 2,116. We are dividing the work when possible, so as to give a share to those who have been unemployed."

MONCTON INCREASES BY 1,000

New Census Shows that Intercolonial Centre Has Had Considerable Growth During the Past Year.

Moncton, N.B., September 29.—A remarkable advance has been made by the City of Moncton during the past year in population, and there has been also a corresponding increase in the number of building permits issued and the valuation. The attendance at the public schools also shows an increase over last year, and the general increase in this city ranks well with other Canadian cities.

CHICAGO TO ADOPT NEW YORK PLANS. Chicago, September 29.—The Chicago Stock Exchange will probably adopt plans to permit trading in stocks and bonds along lines of those already adopted in New York.

GERMANS REPULSED. Paris, September 29.—German attacks on the left wing of the Allies between the Somme and the Oise have been repulsed, it is officially announced.

SERVIANS VICTORIOUS. Nish, Serbia, September 29.—Serbian War Office issued the following statement: "The next few days will see all Austrians expelled from Serbia. Their sole remaining foothold is in the mountains southwest of Krupnik, where our forces are winning in fighting in the mountain passes."

Rube broke his string of losses after thirteen knouts had been tied in it and registered a win. Of course the Braves won. They did not win two games, principally because there was only one scheduled. Bill James was on the firing line and thanks to Red Smith, made the contest his 27th victory.
