ONTARIO ELECTIONS IN JUNE.

The Globe announces this week that the Ontario elections will take place sometime in June. Now, that the organ of the Mowat Government has proclaimed it, it may be accepted as a certainty that the date has been fixed, and it might be added, by way of paraphrase, that the funeral of the Mowat Government has been appointed, and the corpse will be ready. Perhaps the leafy month of June is well chosen for the purpose: the honest yeomen of the Province will find time to give the matter their attention, and to pay the necessary attention to an administration whose unwavering devotion to the deity Mowat has warped its capacity as a legislative body and has hurried it into a vortex out of which there is no means of escape. There can be no mistake that the voice of the country is against Mr. Mowat's Government. Should any doubt it, the verdict of the people's tribunal in June next will surely dispel their doubts. The faint ray of hope that Mr. Mowat gathered from his "Algoma-extension-trick" has been completely dashed by the advent of the National Policy, the general acquiescence of the Ontario people in its discomfiture, instead of furnishing a text that might be utilized to his benefit. Not only is Mr. Mowat responsible for the shortcoming of his Government, when he and his colleagues took the stamp in September last in favor of Mr. Mackenzie, notwithstanding their own expressed intention to nowise interfere with Dominion politics, they accepted the burdens of their greater transgressions. As justice was meted out to Mr. Mackenzie and his followers on the 17th of September, in like manner may the members of the Ontario Government expect to deal with by an election, whose confidence has been contemptuously ignored. While the outlook is every way favorable to the reinstatement of a liberal Conservative Government in this Province, the time for preparation is limited, and the interval should be utilized to the best possible advantage in thoroughly organizing the Conservative party, and the laurels of victory will be all the more precious for each person having performed his part faithfully and well.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

The London Evening Standard has yielded up the ghost after four months experience of the tribulations of independent journalism. A TUNNEL under the Detroit river is again spoken of, and this time with some prospect of success. Mr. Vandell has decided to construct a tunnel for the Canada Southern at Grosse Ile, W. K. Muir, ex-general manager of the C. S. R., states that the tunnel may be extended as an assumed fact. Work is to be commenced on it next month.

It may be inferred from the Governor-General's reply to an address presented to him the 21st inst. by the Ontario Agricultural Arts Association, that their Excellencies will be present to open the next Provincial Exhibition, which is to be held in Ottawa in September, beginning on the 22nd of that month. An effort is being made to impart a Dominion character to the forthcoming Exhibition. Considering the meagre success which has hitherto attended the holding of the Provincial at Ottawa, some manner of improvement is being suggested by the suggestion to secure the co-operation of the lower provinces in the appearance of a lion in the right direction.

No less than twenty-seven cases of supposed pleuro-pneumonia were discovered among the cattle recently landed at Birkenhead by the steamer Brazilian and Ontario. Both cargoes were slaughtered at the port of delarkation under the new regulations respecting American cattle. The discovery of these diseased animals has caused considerable anxiety in England. There was no Canadian cattle among them, the animals being purchased in the Chicago markets. It is somewhat remarkable that if the animals were really infected with this dread disease, that the existence of pleuro-pneumonia in the Western States had not been known previous to this recent discovery. Until further information is received, there is no reason to doubt the correctness of the British authorities' conclusions. However, in the meantime, vigilant precautions should be exercised at Canadian ports to prevent the possibility of importing the disease to this side of the line.

TARIFF NOTES.

The New York Herald is not among those that think the action of Canada in adopting a National Policy, is one that the United States can afford to commend. It says that its Government, unless it wishes to lose beyond recovery the Canadian market, will lose no time in opening negotiations for a new reciprocal treaty. Our protective tariff is beginning to bear fruit soon. "What will they say in England?" is the question which has been agitating the loyal Grit in respect of the new tariff. The matter does not seem to worry the British parliament, or to excite any great despatch dated London, March 20th, says: "On Mr. John Bright putting his question in the House of Commons to-day respecting the new Canadian tariff, the Colonial Secretary replied that the tariff responsibility rests on the Dominion executive, but that the Marquis of Lorne assures the government that no new and objectionable principle is involved."

The Guelph Herald man, not to be outdone by the bird of ill omen that proclaims the infallible (?) destinies of our land from the pinnacle of the Guelph City synagoge, also despatched emissaries to ascertain the effects of the National Policy on the industries of Guelph. The result is perfectly terrible, and demonstrates that the country will be bankrupt inside of a year if the suicidal policy of the present government is carried out. WHAT TO TAKE TO MANITOBA.

The following letter contains just such practical suggestions as every intending settler would do well to be guided by: Very little correct information on the above subject has ever been given in the leading columns of the Prairie Provinces through the "press" of Ontario, while the people and "press" of Manitoba have been industriously promulgating the most erroneous and untrue statements all their efforts into money here before starting. Now, this is an erroneous idea, and one that entails great loss of money to the emigrant, as well as an immense amount of inconvenience and loss of time on their arrival there. I have made several trips to that country, and the most satisfactory ones that I have made were one of a party of four, who hired two cars in Hamilton for Fisher's at the rate of \$75 per car, one car my partner and I put four horses, harness, two wagons, two sleighs, harness, two pigs, two dogs, one passenger who was allowed to go in the car free of charge, and tend to stock, besides all the household goods of two large families, from books etc., to ordinary cooking utensils, and everything else that was required by the party, and we were able to give a great entertainment sale, except tables, chairs, stoves, piano, ploughs (Ontario ploughs are useless there), and such furniture as would hardly be suitable for a new country. The result was highly satisfactory. We found upon our arrival there that we were better off than when we left home, while those people to be found there as well as in other countries ready to extort an outrageous price out of new-comers who are ignorant of the value of the things they see at a glance that we were no gainers for them. We found that our position was much better than that of many a settler who enters the country with fully as much cash as we should have had had we sacrificed our goods at an auction before starting. Our horses, worth \$120 each, were there worth \$120 each, and in fact at that peculiar time (the spring of 1877) our horses were worth \$100. Had they been sold there they would probably have brought \$50 or \$60 each. Our goods had also been sold at a great profit. We had a store of groceries and lard, which we had a perfect treasure as compared with Manitoba prices. We were also ready to set up our own camp, spread our covers and commence camp life at once, thereby saving large hotel bills, while our own horses enabled us to go about hunting up land, without incurring any hire, and in a few days we were quite comfortably situated on our land, with an amount of our old familiar home comforts from Ontario, which we had not a striking contrast to the meagre furnishings and fit-out of the neighbor who left his wife and children in the hands of a speculator to purchase what he wanted there, but sadly disappointed in his expectations. A man who sells his effects here in the store is at an advantage, and adds to the proceeds the cost of a car, cannot possibly replace the articles in Manitoba for the same amount of money. It is all very well for people in Ontario to advise intending settlers to take nothing with them except their money. It simply means oxen at \$150 per yoke, horses \$250 to \$300 per team, harness \$40 (such as can be bought here for \$28) and other things at from 25 to

THE McCABE POISONING CASE.

The trial of George McCabe and Dr. Bowers for the poisoning of the McCabes by poison, commenced at Woodstock on Tuesday before Chief Justice Wilson, and is still in progress. The evidence taken up to Wednesday evening was in favor of the preliminary investigation, and is decidedly unfavorable to the prisoners. Subjoined is the testimony of Robert Kneeshaw, a druggist. I am a druggist in Ingersoll; John Gayer is my partner; I know Dr. Bowers; he buys drugs from me; I bought five grains of sulphate of strychnine at my store on December 18th last; it is an alkaloid of belladonna; George Hughill, my clerk, weighed it out; I did not see it weighed; it is not a very readily vegetable poison; it is not so strong as aconite; a tenth of a grain is a dose; Dr. Bowers ordered for it; it came out of the store; I was asked for a pharmacopoeia; I handed it to him and left him with my clerk; he asked for aconite first; we had no aconite in the store; I saw the aconite delivered to the doctor on Friday morning, the 20th, about nine o'clock; aconite is a vegetable poison; it is about the most deadly poison we have; I have not sold any before for twenty years; I saw what purported to be the same medicine on Saturday; Dr. Bowers bought it; I saw it with him; he told me Mr. McCabe was dead; when I saw it in Dr. Bowers' hand it was in an open jar; he said he had death was caused by heart disease; he asked me to weigh the grains of aconite out of the parcel, and put it in an ounce bottle to fill it up with water; I did so; aconite is an expensive medicine; it was invoiced to us at 15 cents a grain. Mr. Kneeshaw was then submitted to a long and severe examination by both Mr. Norris and Mr. Fletcher, but the purchase of aconite was fully proved.
