The property extends between the premises of Mr. John Mann and Mrs. Leslie Angus's premises, including an old house which stands back from the street front. The frontage is over a hundred feet and is valuable. Representatives of the Corporation were in the city to-day with reference to the matter.

Wife Deserter's Portion.

John Riley, a ship's fireman, was at Middlesborough, on Tuesday sent to six weeks' hard labour for deserting his wife in 1910. He said he made a special journey from France to find out where his wife was and to make a home for her. When he got to Middlesborough, he had £14 10 s. in his pockets but he was drugged and had the money taken from him by 'land sharks.'

A Sad Death

Miss Annie Mann Passed Away Suddenly This Morning.

The many friends of Miss Annie Mann will regret to hear of her untimely death, which occurred at the family residence, 65 Alfred St. early this morning. The end came peacefully after a severe attack of heart trouble, which attacked her immediately after she had returned home after attending Colborne St. Church on Sunday evening. The lung motor had been resorted to and had proved efficacious for three hours, but other complications set in, and the sufferer was carried to the great beyond. The deceased was born in England, and came to Canada in 1867, settling in Brantford. She had been an ardent church worker, and has been a member of Colborne Street Methodist Church since its erection. Her circle of church friends will lose a most sincere and devout Christian. Besides her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. John Mann, deceased leaves a large family of brothers and sisters to mourn the sad loss. They are brothers George T. of London, John R. of Ohio, Fred of this city, Walter of Toronto, (Dr.) Albert E. of Taunton, Mass., and sisters, Mrs. Edmund Harley, of Toronto, and Mrs. E. B. Terryberry of Woodstock. The funeral will take place at Greenwood cemetery on Wednesday at 3 o'clock, when the Rev. T. E. Holling will conduct the last services.

Whiskey Cure for Measles.

Whiskey as a remedy for measles was mentioned at an inquest at Stockport on Alfred Chard, the thirteen-month-old son of a cotton operative. The mother said that when the child contracted measles she put him to bed, giving him whiskey and saffron water. Dr. R. Nightingale said that whiskey and saffron was an old-fashioned remedy for measles. "Death from natural causes" was the verdict.
