

KITCHENER'S RECRUITS SWEEP GERMAN LINES WITH COLD STEEL

British Tradesmen Rout Conscript foe Men.

British Headquarters, Sept. 28.—I am now able to write a straight, clear story with many interesting details of the fighting which began Saturday morning last and still continues upon the same ground.

There were many battalions of new army men among those who led the attack, and among them were Scottish regiments who had their full share of horrors in the first assault.

Other men were among them—regiments which already had been battered and scattered in many terrible days of war.

These splendid boys listened through the night of Friday last to the intense bombardment which preceded the assault.

Smashing Again at Russian Right Wing in Last Great Effort.

WHOLE GERMAN LINE FROM LENS TO ARRAS MUST RETREAT IF BRITISH DRIVE CONTINUES

Three German Army Corps Destroyed in Champagne.

New York, Sept. 30.—The London correspondent of "The Herald" says: "The stirring description of the glorious behaviour of Lord Kitchener's new armies in the advance on and capture of Loos and the story of triumph in Mesopotamia, are completely overshadowed by the news that in Champagne and the Argonne, in addition to capturing 25,000 men, fully three army corps, or 120,000 men, made up of the flower of the Kaiser's troops, including regiments of the famous Prussian Guards, have been killed or wounded.

GOOD NEWS HELD BACK.

It is whispered everywhere that the French victory is much greater than the official communique reports and that the German lines despite the reported presence of the Kaiser on the western front have been broken at the Somme-Py, and that the Crown Prince's army is in danger of having its communications cut.
