TIBETANS IN ARMED REBELLION IN SZE-CHUAN PROVINCE

Favorable Weather Increases Activity in West

UNREST IN CHINA GRAVE

Tibetans, in Armed Rebellion, Capture Towns in Sze-Chuan

Restoration of Monarchy May Be Planned by Chang-Soulin

Peking Monday, March 11.—Taking advantage of disorder in the Province of Sze-Chuan, the Tibetans have rebelled and are marching into Sze-Chuan, where they have captured several towns.

General Chang Soulin recently intercepted a large shipment of arms from Japan intended for the use of the Chinese Government.

In a mandate early in January, President Feng Kwo-Chang assumed responsibility for the country's political troubles and announced that he would resign shortly.


Favorable weather on most of the western front has led to increased fighting but none of the armies has yet made an attack in great strength.

USE DUTCH SHIPS

By Courier Leased Wire London, March 14.—Because of the long delays in the negotiations with Holland over Dutch ships in Allied ports and the slowness of the Dutch government to act in this respect, Great Britain and the United States have reached an agreement to end the negotiations and take over all such ships next week for the use of the Allies.

FIVE KILLED; SIX INJURED, IN AIR RAID

Zepplins Made a Second Attack on England Last Night

DAMAGE VERY LIGHT No Attempt to Reach London District—Hartlepool Bombed

London, Mar. 14.—In last night's air raid one airship crossed the coast and dropped four bombs on Hartlepool. Six dwelling houses were demolished there and thirty were damaged.

The following official statement was issued: "Only one airship crossed the coast last night. It dropped four bombs on Hartlepool. The raid, which was operating at a great altitude, only remained over land a few minutes and the remainder of its bombs appear to have fallen into the sea."
