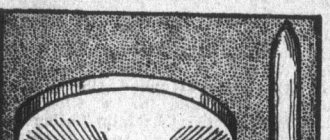

A SIMPLE GUN.

**You Can Make It With a Spoon and
Two Strong Rubber Bands.**
Any boy who wants a good gun can
have it, and he can make it himself in
a few minutes.

Get two rubber bands and a good
sized spoon from which the thread has
been taken. Fasten one rubber upon
the spoon, as shown in the illustration,
by binding it tightly with the other.
The arrow is any thin stick that will
slide easily through the spoon. The
best arrows are made of dowels, which

are three feet long and one-fourth inch
thick. These may be purchased at any
hardware store at a cost of one cent
each. Sharpen one end of the arrow
and cut a notch in the other.

To use, place the arrow in the spoon,
put the rubber in the notch and pull
both rubber and arrow out as far as
possible. If the spoon is held in the
left hand and the rubber is strong
enough it will shoot the arrow fully
fifty feet away. Make your arrow long
enough to carry well.
