The vote in the House of Lords on the bill to legalize marriage with a deceased's wife's sister, was defeated by 101 to 90. The Prince of Wales, who has long been a steady supporter of the measure, voted with the minority, as did also his brothers, the Dukes of Edinburgh and Connaught.

HON. MR. CHAMBERLAIN, in his speech before the St. Jean Baptiste Convention in Quebec, alluded to *Les Canadiens Francais* as the missionaries appointed by divine authority to evangelize the United States, and did not believe that they should be induced to return. But in spite of this his Government believe in repatriation, and spend money for it too.

It has leaked out that at the St. Jean Baptiste Convention at Quebec an address to the Pope was moved by the President, Mr. Chauveau, and unanimously agreed to, affirming that the French Canadians of North America were loyally devoted to him, that they had already sent Pontifical Zonaves to defend his temporal power, and that they were ready to-day to send bayonets and troops to him sufficient to reinstate him, and write in blood their detestation of the Italian tyrants who deposed His Holiness. This may prove a nice little question for English diplomats to settle with Italy should the latter deem it worthy of notice.

The Journal of Commerce effectually disposes of the stock Tory argument against the late Government in the following terse terms:—"There can be no greater delusion than to imagine that the Government of the country is responsible for the depression, or that it is possible to afford relief by legislation. The only remedy is the observance of strict economy by the people, and the curtailment of the credit system which has so fearfully aggravated the distress. It is well likewise to bear in mind that, so long as we are borrowers from Great Britain, the amount of our loans will come in the form of goods, no matter what duties we may impose to keep them out."

ORATORIO OF ST. PETER.—The second rendering of the Oratorio of St. Peter took place in the Catholic Church on Tuesday evening, and was fairly attended, considering the very large audience that was present on the first presentation last week. The Oratorio was considerably curtailed, but the best parts were given. The practice on the first night gave the singers more confidence, and in consequence the several parts were better done than at the first representation. The Oratorio, Father Fleck, the conductor, deserves the greatest credit for the great labor he has been at in getting up the Oratorio. He is a singer of no mean ability himself, and the spirit and enthusiasm he manifests shows what he might be able to accomplish if he would take up some of the great Oratorios. In the instrumental parts he has most efficient help, and for the vocal parts he has material enough to work on, and which could be made effective with steady drilling.

Several residences in Acton were burglarized on Friday night and a few small articles stolen.

Captain Farrell of the steamboat *Corinthian*, brother of the late Bishop Farrell, of Hamilton, died suddenly at Kingston on Monday. He was one of the oldest lake captains in Canada.

Toronto Correspondence.

Toronto, June 23, 1880.

Now that Mr. John Beverley Robinson has been appointed Lieut.-Governor, there is considerable speculation who will be the candidate for West Toronto. Of those spoken of the most prominent are Mayor Beatty, W. B. Canavan, Conservative, and W. S. McMurich, Liberal. Mr. Beatty is a fine fellow personally, who has deservedly gained considerable popularity, but as a politician it is simply unkind to him to mention his name as a fit and proper person to represent this great city in Parliament. To be sure he is a good and indeed very much better than those who have, but there are signs that the citizens want more than voting machines to represent them in Parliament. W. B. Canavan is also blessed with a measure of popularity, but on one or two occasions before he played fast and loose with the Liberals in retiring from the field at the last moment, in favour of the Conservative candidate. He has always been a Conservative, but on two occasions he acted as an Independent and came out against the duly chosen candidate of the Tories. By doing so the Liberals promised him support, and he rewarded that by retiring from the field in favour of the Tory candidate—thus leaving the Reformers only a few days to bring a man out. His little game is played out—if he comes out he will only get the Conservative support. As for the Liberal candidate it must be said he has all the elements of success. He is popular, clever, experienced and young, and when added to these qualities is indomitable perseverance, one has good hopes for his success if he can be induced to come out. The great difficulty with the Liberal candidates in this case is that they have too much "starch in their collar," a little less of that and a little more appreciation of the tactics requisite to successfully carry on a political contest would have turned many a defeat into a victory. Mr. McMurich is well qualified to represent the Liberals in the almost certain contest that is to take place in the western division of this city, and we hope he will be induced to come out in their interests.

At length the council of the wealthy County of York have commenced to consider in earnest the advisability of erecting a new Court House. It is necessary to say this plausible disposition was not brought about by "inherent conviction" but by the fact that two or three indictments are now pending against the County for maintaining a nuisance in the shape of the Court House. Not even the gravity of the situation they are thus placed in has had the effect of "convincing" them for at the end of the session at which they resolved to build the Court House they gave the grand jury, which have repeatedly complained of the building and which brought in true bills against the County, a savage dig. They passed a resolution reciting the fact that the grand jury have so far had the public welfare at heart as to complain of the Court house, but called their attention to the fact that there are many intolerable nuisances in the north-eastern portion of the city, and which have entirely escaped attention at their hands. The sting of this resolution is in its truth, for there are many nuisances in that neighbourhood, particularly a fine factory, the small form of which is really sufficient to take one's breath away. The most likely site to be selected is a block of land situated on the corner of King and Simcoe streets, opposite Upper Canada College and St. Andrew's Church. If this site be obtained and the Court house there erected the four "actions" will be broken up. At present one corner is St. Andrew's Church, on another Government House, on another Upper Canada College, and on the fourth a tavern. These corners are respectively named: Salvation, Legislation, Education and "Damnation"—damnation will in all likelihood be removed.

Fifty years ago this month the first Presbyterian church was erected in this city, and the Presbyterians intend celebrating the occasion by having a jubilee consisting of special services to be held next Sunday at which Drs. Macrae and Grant will officiate, and a prize meeting on Monday evening.

The principal topic of conversation on our streets is the trial and conviction of the murderer of Hon. George Brown. General satisfaction is expressed with the verdict, and so Bennett will go to the scaffold amid the execrations of the populace. The correspondence and communications found on him, and which have been published, show him to be a man of considerable power intellectually. It is a thousand pities that such gifts had not been turned to a better account.

The George Brown memorial fund is progressing favorably, notwithstanding the dull times. Such a stir has already been made that this movement is almost sure to be a success. There is plenty of wealth in this city, and if there is a deficiency to be made, that shall be made up real soon, that the whole movement should fail. Great expectations are however held of a generous response from the country, and it will be a great pity if disappointment and not success is the result.

Many say one of the most prominent institutions in the city during the summer months is the multitude of excursion steamers. Of all the trips and steamers the most favored is the trip to Niagara on the steamers *Chloris* and *City of Toronto*, being the fastest, most commodious and steady sailing vessels that can be found in our inland marine. Our citizens largely use these steamers to get away from the dust and heat of the city, but residents of provincial towns and rural districts also patronize them extensively owing to their sailing three times a day, 7 a.m., 2 p.m., and 3.30 p.m., and returning at 8 p.m., an opportunity is given visitors from the country of spending several hours in the city sight-seeing, and then a trip across the lake and back in time to return on the same day, or by taking the 7 a. m. boat to Niagara and the Canada Southern railway from Niagara to the Falls, a visit of several hours' duration can be had to the Falls and a trip on the railway through a most beautiful tract of country. As a trip to the country is beneficial to the inhabitants of a crowded city, so is a visit to a city beneficial to the inhabitants of a country and provincial towns, and especially is a trip on the lake enjoyable to those who live far from the great water stretches. To those who contemplate taking a short trip no other one can offer equal attractions with the one above mentioned, and excursion trips are not do better than give it their favorable consideration.

Canadian Cattle in England.

The Wellington Cattle Highly Praised.

We copy the following from the London correspondence of the *Globe*. It will be seen that it speaks very highly of the shipments made from Guelph by Messrs. Craig & Co., of which firm Mr. Wm. Hearne, who has just returned from England, is a member:—"The trade with the St. Lawrence is now in full swing, and the first consignments of live stock from the Dominion are of the most gratifying character. The cattle are really first-class, but not a whit better than they need be if Canada is to hold her own in our markets. I have already referred to the contemplated efforts to bring Australia into the competition, and I now observe paragraphs floating about intimating not only an extension of the live cattle trade from Denmark and Schleswig-Holstein, but the opening out of a dead meat trade with Austria. The Directors of the London Food Stores, 316 Oxford-street, London, who are the prime movers in this venture, recently entertained a company at luncheon, the food mainly consisting of dishes prepared from the German and Austrian fresh meat, imported by means of refrigerators. I notice also a paragraph stating that sheep may be brought over from the Continent in any quantity. I am rather inclined to doubt the existence of any large supply, for I have gained the impression somehow that stocks are thin. At any rate, I am informed on unquestionable authority that made in sheep from the Continent at present shows the barest margin of profit, so bare in fact that the average cannot exceed 25 cents per head. Again, the quality of the cross-bred and other Continental breeds, which are kept more for their wool than their mutton, is not well suited to our markets, and much will have to be done ere they come to rival, or materially affect, the best Canadian mutton. Neither do I think your farmers need be much alarmed by the Continental cattle trade. The limited area of Denmark and other states where superior breeds are kept; the fact that they are bred rather for milking than their flesh producing qualities; and also the very considerable home market that exists, are all good reasons why their competition should not be formidable.

As long as Canada sends us animals such as a shipment from the neighbourhood of Guelph, imported by Messrs. Craig & Company, which arrived recently, she has nothing to fear from any competitor. It is not too much to say that they are of a superior quality, and fetched the best price in the market. No better cattle, I believe, except of course, pedigree and prize beasts, have ever reached this country from the American continent.

I notice with pleasure that a valuable selection of polled Aberdeen cattle has just been forwarded to the Dominion. You will, no doubt, already have received the details concerning these animals. It has been often pointed out that for beef-producing qualities no cross is so desirable for Canada as that of the polled Aberdeen, because no breed makes an immediate and powerful impression. Hence its value when the turning to good and quick account of the inferior native breeds is so much desired, as it now is, in the Dominion, and especially in the Province of Quebec. In conversation with the late Mr. McCombie, the well-known Aberdeenshire breeder, he informed me that of his own place he had placed to his pedigree Aberdeen bulls, more than 90 per cent. threw polled calves, and I may add, as a singular corroboration of this statement, that at the last Smithfield Show the prize beef was got by a roan Shorthorn bull from a polled Aberdeen cow, and this beast was in every characteristic polled, and black at that. It may be argued that the polled Aberdeens are not good for anything but milk, and that there are families of Aberdeens which, as milkers, will compare favourably with any other breed. But I think mainly required therefore is care and judgment in selection.
