Classes in instruction for mine  
rescue work, including a thorough  
training in the use of the Draeger

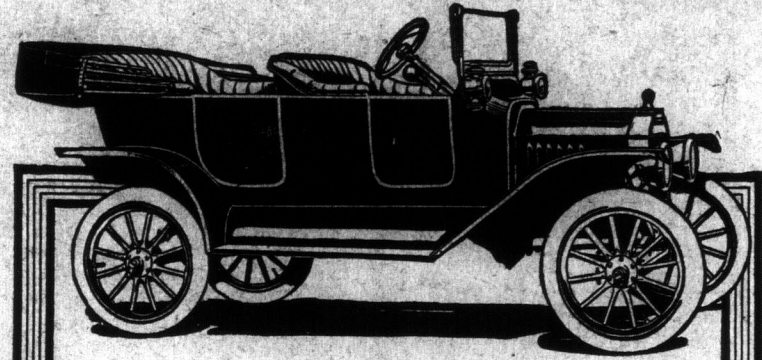
