General Intelligence

Local Legislature

FREDERICTON, April 25.—Hon. Mr.
White introduced a bill amending chap-
ter 100 of the laws of the province, the
purpose of the bill being to amend the
act authorizing the acceptance of
policies of guarantee companies
as security for public officers; also a bill
amending the registration of births,
deaths and marriages act. Mr. Porter
introduced a bill incorporating the New
Brunswick Pulp and Paper Co., Ltd.
Mr. Hesse a bill to dispense with the use
of parchment in all matters; Hon. Mr.
Dunn, amending the law respecting busi-
ness licenses issued by the city of St. John
making it not apply against the country.
On motion of Hon. Mr. Treadwell, sec-
onded by Hon. Mr. Farnham, was resolu-
ted that copies of the resolution passed
respecting the Canada Eastern railway
be ingressed and forwarded to Sir Wilfrid
Laurier, the Secretary of State, and Hon.
Mr. Blair.

Bill relating to county exhibitions,
to the supreme court practice, incorpo-
rating the St. John W. C. T. U., incor-
porating Grand Falls and amending the
law relating to the county of Miramichi,
amending the public health act, amend-
ing the law relating to the sewers and
sanitation, amending the election law,
changing the term of the Sanitary court
and incorporating Milltown, were agreed
to.

Mr. McKinnon's bill to declare and
explain the meaning of the covenant for
renewal in leases for renewable terms
was agreed to. On Mr. Robertson's bill
to confirm a conveyance from the city of
St. John to the Canadian Pacific
Railway Co., progress was reported with
leave to sit again.

The game law bill making the open
season for moose and caribou and De-
cember 31 was vigorously discussed.
Several members wanted the season to
end November 30, and declared all the
hunting in December was for the moose,
but by sportmen, but the section
passed and the season will now be
September 15 to December 31.

FREDERICTON, April 26.—The bill
amending the births, deaths and mar-
riages act is to postpone the repeal of the
act to 1899, so as to enable the govern-
ment to make the same time as the
act.

The agriculture committee met this
morning. A committee of three was ap-
pointed to draw up resolutions endorsing
the agricultural policy of the government.
The question of county exhibitions was
discussed.

Mr. Owan was of the opinion that
instead of each society in the county
holding a separate exhibition over such a
large and consolidated exhibition in the
county.

Mr. Smith was of the same opinion,
and thought this year the up river
counties would join in having a large
exhibition.

Mr. McLeod did not believe in local
shows.

Mr. Campbell said the only objection
to county shows was that it was hard
to get all societies in the county to co-
operate.

Mr. Owan said any suggestion re-
garding agriculture made by the com-
mittee to the House would have a good
effect.

Mr. Carpenter thought agricultural
societies no benefit to the country.

Mr. O'Brien (Northumberland) re-
garded county exhibitions as the best.

Mr. Russell said that in some cases he
had seen the same patchwork quilts
carried to different exhibitions over such
a long distance.

He was a boy and did not believe in
local shows, but a general exhibition
with a meeting to discuss agriculture
in the evening.

Mr. Porter moved that in the opinion
of the committee the agriculture grant
was better expended in establishing
cream stations, flour mills, in the im-
portation of wheat and in lectures on
farming, etc., than holding exhibitions.

The committee adjourned till to-mor-
row morning, when the committee
appointed to draft the above resolutions
will report.

The law committee took up the resolu-
tion principally by discussing the law re-
lating to the publication of the Lord's
day, which was thrown out.
