REFORTS OF OFFICERS.

H. C. R. C. E. Britton read his report, which showed that the Order was on the increase, both in regard to numbers and finances.

The following extracts from the numbers and finances.

The following extracts from the High Secretary's report will be of interest to members of the Order:

Last year our total membership on May 31st was 18,641. This year the total membership made up of 19,578 in good standing, and 1,213 under temporary suspension, gives us a total membership of 20,791, a net increase for the year of 2,150 members.

a total membership of 20,791, a net increase for the year of 2,150 members.

Sixty-one courts have been organized during the year, and 3,090 members have been initiated, 940 having been permanently suspended. In 1880 the membership was 850, with a reserve fund of \$898,50, and in that year \$5,582,50 was paid in claims. This year, with 20,791 members, the Order paid out \$105,647,10 in claims, and has a reserve fund of \$393,544,58.

The High Treasurer, John Neelon, reported the total receipts on account of insurance fund at \$175,944,12. The revenue last year in interest alone was \$13,371,21. At the beginning of the year the balance in insurance fund was \$323,247,56, which, added to the receipts of the year, gave the order a gross revenue of \$499,191,68. The number of death claims was 102, in liquidation of which was paid out the sum of \$105,647,10, leaving on hand the large sum of \$393,544,58.

#### IS EXE POWER DETERIORATING? It Seems so to an Oculist, Who Gives Some Instances to Prove it.

Instances to Prove it.

"I think the eye power of the present generation of civilized men must have deteriorated a good deal," said an oculist to me the other day. "I am called upon to examine so many young persons nowadays whose eyes show no symptoms of disease or strabismus, but are simply unable to do the ordinary amount of work required of school boys, school girls, college students or moderate readers without showing symptoms of overwork.

"This weakness seems to be constitutional, and glasses are required which lessen the muscular strain on the eyes only. In spite of the invention of the typewriter, which has relieved the eye of so much work, the state of things is almost equally as prevalent in business circles as among students."

"That this is a deterioration from the men of old is evidenced, I think, by the vast amount of work some of them are known to have done without any trouble from their eyes. Take Dickens voluminous works, for instance. He wrote them all with his own hand, volume after volume, and composing is a far greater strain on the eyes than mere copying or reading, since composing or studying involve mental effort as well as physical.

"Dickens wrote a great deal of the time with blue ink upon blue paper and his erasures and interlineations were done in so fine a hand that it used to be the despair of the printers. "Scott wrote all his numerous works and poems without the aid of an amanuensis; Johnson did the vast amount of work involved in his dictionary in the same way, and Thackeray, who wrote his long drawn out stories in an almost ingly but truthfully that if he failed to make a living as a novelist he could earn money by exhibiting his abilities to write the Lord's Frayer on his thumb nail.

# HOW TO TELL THE KEY.


