veatly cheapen for the Government to cost of material for the construction along the main line west. The line further north will run through a fine country, well settled, and able to produce grain enough to increase to a large extent the traffic on the line to Thunder Bay. It will, more over, tap the Saskatch wan country. Settlers in the Korth-West will thus have way facilities. Not only will thus have brought into contact with good markets, but they will be able to procure lumber and fuel at moderate rates, as several of the feeding lines will plerce timber districts.

Moreover, whole industries have left our shores, and markets which were once peculiarly our own have been transplanted to the continent and the United States. The silklooms of Spitalfields are roaring now in Lyons, and the Clerkenwell watch has given place to the Yankee timepiece; sewing machines, type-writers, telephones and a thousand ingenious novelties, are sent us from ingenious novelties, are sent us from America as a kind of boon, and we are glad to get them for the money." Yet free traders still argue that countries possessing protective tariffs cannot successfully compete with free trade nations.
