FARM LOANS
for SOLDIERS

How Returned Men Can
Become Farmers

EVERY returned man who wants to become a farmer and is qualified for that vocation can get real, practical help through the Soldier Settlement Board.

The Government's programme includes:—

- (1) The securing of land.
- (2) The loaning of capital needed to purchase equipment and live stock, and erect buildings.
- (3) Agricultural training and farm supervision.

The Loans Granted

Loans may be approved by the Loan Advisory Committee, according to the needs of the settler, on the following basis:—

- (1) Up to \$4,500 on the purchase of land.
- (2) Up to \$2,000 on the purchase of live stock, implements and other equipment.
- (3) Up to \$1,000 on the erection of buildings and other permanent improvements.

The first and third are repayable in twenty-five equal annual instalments; the second in four equal annual instalments beginning the third year, no interest being charged for the first two years.

On all these loans the low interest rate of five per cent will be charged. A cash payment of ten per cent of the purchase price will be required on the land but this may be waived by the Board in special cases.

Qualified settlers on Dominion lands may secure loans up to a

maximum of \$3,000 on a plan similar to the above for farm equipment, live stock, and erection of buildings, provided security offered justifies the loan.

To Whom Granted

To be entitled to these privileges a man must have served with an honourable record in the Canadian, Imperial, or British Colonial forces in an actual theatre of war or outside of the country in which he enlisted (service in U.S. or Bermuda not included). Others eligible are:

A British subject who lived in Canada before the War and who was on active service with the Allied Forces in an actual theatre of war.

A member of the Canadian Expeditionary Force who served in Canada only, but is in receipt of a pension for disability occasioned by such service.

These benefits are also granted to widows of such men.

A Broad Policy

All soldiers whose best interests will be served by taking up farms will be assisted. Only suitable land will be approved. That is (a) land that is near to existing railways or organized communities; (b) land that will make money for the soldier; (c) land that will provide a first class home.

In addition to these advantages the Board has planned a system of collective purchase, so that it can guarantee settlers the best value obtainable anywhere in live stock, implements, lumber, and other needs. It will also assist soldier settlers with advice and supervision, if necessary, in the management of their activities, so that the best results will be obtained.

700 GLASSWORKERS LOSE
PLACES BECAUSE OF DRY ACT
Cincinnati, O., May 8.—Seven hundred men were thrown out of employment today when the Boldt Glass Works shut down its plant.

The company announced that, owing to approaching prohibition, it was forced to close the works, but, in case the President lifted the war-time prohibition ban, all of the men would be given work the day following.

CALL ISSUED
FOR SESSION
OF CONGRESS

President Wilson Makes Proclamation for Extra Session to be Held at Washington on May 19th.

Washington, D.C., May 8.—President Wilson issued a call by cable today for a special session of congress to meet on Monday, May 19th. Secretary Tumulty, in making the announcement, said it would be impossible, of course, for the President to be here on the opening day. The date fixed for the special session was much earlier than Democratic leaders expected.

White House officials said that in naming an early date for the session President Wilson was guided largely by the advice of Secretary Glass as to the necessity of passing annual appropriation measures which passed in the closing days of the last session.

TO FORM ASSOCIATION,

After the regular business was transacted, the Public School Board at its meeting last night decided to take steps to form an Urban School Trustees' Association. Towards this end the Secretary of the Board was instructed to send invitations to the school trustees of all incorporated cities in the Province of Ontario to meet in St. Catharines on June 26th.

DOLLAR SILVER FOR YEARS, SAYS BAKER

New York, May 8.—Director of the U. S. Mint, Raymond I. Baker, expressed himself as follows:

The Fillman Act was passed to relieve a condition in world trade and exchange, which was wholesale, and was speedily growing dangerous. Under authority conferred by the Act we turned 350,000,000 silver dollars into bullion and exported the silver to the value of \$260,000,000, most of it going to India. Shipments were also made to the credit of our allies, the allocation of the amounts being determined by their needs. By means of these shipments favorable effect was had in the way of stabilizing rates of exchange.

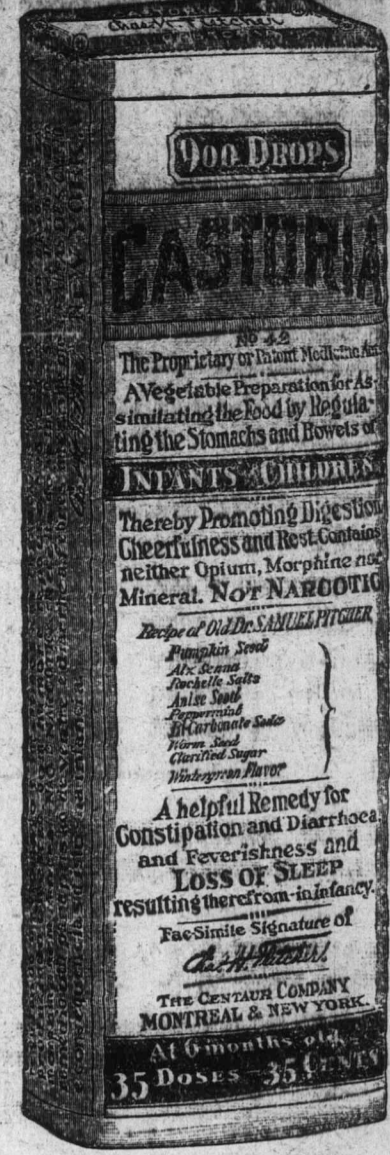
Ordinarily the silver purchases for the mint are much less than were made in 1918; in fact, the quantity handled during 1918 was two and two thirds greater than the quantity handled in 1917. It is quite likely that the purchases of silver under the Fillman Act will extend over a period of ten years, and also that these purchases will have the effect of keeping up the price of the metal during that period.

There is still a tremendous demand for silver, from India and the Orient and the European countries also are crying for the metal. The demand for silver will grow, I believe, with the expansion in world trade following upon reconstruction in Europe and revival of industry.

There is reasonable basis for belief in dollar silver for some years to come, he said, but I would not venture anything beyond that, although we never can tell. At \$1 an ounce, though, silver mining is very profitable. It is profitable at 85 cents an ounce.

DAMAGE TO THE YOUNG TOMATOES

That the prolonged wintry conditions that are prevailing throughout Ontario have resulted in actual damage in the case of tender plants is beyond dispute. At the end of last week there was every reason to believe that no vital damage had been done, and this is probably the case still with the hardy tree fruits. In fact, Mr. Percy Hodggets of the Department of Agriculture has as yet no report of damage to fruit trees or even to tender fruits. Mr. Hodggets, however, confirmed the reports of serious damage to young vegetable seedlings. "We do not know exactly the extent of this damage," said Mr.

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Hodgets, "but we are in touch with at least two counties—Essex and Prince Edward. In each of these there has been sufficient harm done to be very noticeable. The District Representative of the department in Essex estimates the damage at several hundred thousand dollars, so it must be rather extensive in that county."

What damage has occurred is due, probably, to the excessive rain and cold weather of Sunday last, when tender plants in cold frames were put to a severe test, hail falling in some parts of the Province.
