In all Catholic Elementary schools in Scotland at present receiv ing State aid, a time table is framed by or with the approval of his Majesty's inspectors. That time table is usually framed so that religious teaching is given before the beginning or after the close of the State school day. For example, if the fellows from 3 30 to 4. The teachers are employed by the Catholic managers.
