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DELEGATES RESENT DISCOURTESY SHOWN

No Effort Made by School or Civic Officials in Strathcona to Entertain Trustees Attending Convention—University City Trustees Themselves Not Present—Closing Session.

The school trustees from all parts of the province of Alberta brought a two-day session at Strathcona to a close Thursday afternoon.

The convention next year will be held at Lethbridge. The last business of the convention was the election of officers. They were chosen as follows:

First vice-president—Rev. A. R. Aldridge, Vermilion.
Second vice-president—W. O. Malcolm, Innisfail.

The convention Thursday morning opened with a paper on Management of Rural Schools by William Mason.

Mr. Manning at the close of his paper, regretted that more interest had not been shown by the school trustees in the giving of the grant.
