## **BORDEN GOVERNMENT** HAS MAJORITY OF 44

This is the Result of First Division in the Commons-Vote on Amendment to Reply to Speech-Large Number of Questions Are Answered by Ministers.

Ottawa, Nov. 29-The result of the debate on the address is a majority of 44 for the Government but no declaration of the navel policy or an explanation of the remarkable elliance between the ultra Imperialists and the Nationalists.

The election of Blondin, the ultra-Nationalist as deputy speaker; Sproule, ex-Grand Master of the Orangemen as speaker and White ex-Liberal, and friend of the trust, as Minister of Finance shows either that party government has entered upon an entirely new phase or that there has been a remarkable party change which may or may not be acceptable to the country when it is properly understood.


