LONDON, To-day.

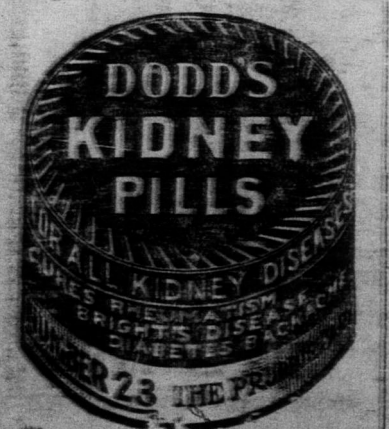

LOSSES BY STORMS.—During the recent stormy weather much damage to property resulted at Ferryland. Most of the breakwater was carried away by the high sea which ran and two stages and a lot of fishing gear, the whole valued at \$500, owned by James Devereaux, was swept away, while John Costello lost a stage and a lot of fishing gear which he values at, at least \$100.

Wrestling Match.

The Berry-Olson wrestling match takes place this evening at 8.30 in the C. L. B. Armoury. They met yesterday and Mr. E. J. Goodland was decided on as referee. The following is a copy of the agreement:—

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT made this 25th day of January, 1912, BETWEEN ROBERT BERRY, of the one part, and YOUNG OLSON, of the other part, witnesses as follows: The parties agree to wrestle in the Church Lads' Brigade Armoury, St. John's, Newfoundland, on Friday, January 26th, 1912, under the following conditions, namely:—

(a) The match to be to a finish at catch-as-catch-can style, best two out of three falls, pin falls only counting; strangle hold and toe hold barred; likewise scratching, kicking, boring and punching; contestants to wear regular gymnasium shoes, and not to have grease, resin or any other pernicious drug on any part of the body.

(b) If either man quit, whether through accident or any other cause, decision to go to his opponent.

(c) The match to be for the belts owned by the said Robert Berry and Young Olson, respectively, at present in the possession of the Evening Herald.

(d) Contestants to weigh in between the hours of noon and 1 o'clock p.m. on the day of match, at the store of the Martin Hardware Co., Ltd. at 361 lbs.

(e) Each of the parties agree to deposit with the Evening Herald, newspaper, of St. John's, the sum of One Hundred Dollars as a forfeit in case the above weight clause be not complied with.

(f) Should any party fail to weigh in at the hour stipulated, he agrees to forfeit One Hundred Dollars to be deducted from his share of the receipts, in addition to the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) before mentioned as weight forfeit.

(g) The belts now in the possession of the Evening Herald are a guarantee to win the match, both to be awarded to the winner of the match.

(h) The Referee to be appointed by Mr. Reginald Dowden, of the Evening Herald, St. John's.

(i) In the event of either of the parties failing for any reason whatever to appear on the mat to participate in the said match on the above mentioned date, the above mentioned belt owned by him to be forfeited to the other party.

Plotting to Overthrow King Peter.

LONDON, To-day.

A despatch from Vienna says gipsy tidings have been received there from Serbia. They foreshadow sensational events, resembling those which preceded the King and Queen and several members of the Cabinet of 1902. Two secret military leagues dominate the political situation and newspapers guardedly print hints of military dictatorship. A despatch from Belgrade on January 23rd stated that another plot against the dynasty has been discovered and that an organization, called the "Blackhands," composed of the younger officers of the army, had for its object the overthrow of King Peter. The Crown Prince, who is the Inspector General of the Army, has been compelled to resign, because of the discovery of the existence of such a secret organization in the army.

Baleine Had Rough Trip.

The s.s. Baleine, which arrived here yesterday from Bay Roberts, where she discharged coal, had a terrible time of it on her way to Sydney. She left Caplin Bay, where she had sheltered, on Friday last and Saturday night met a terrific snow storm and a gale of N.W. wind in the Gulf. She was compelled to lay to all night with tremendous sea running, and at 7 a.m. Sunday the wheel chains parted. The chief and third engineers with the captain and nearly all the crew worked hard to repair the damage, which was not done till 10 a.m., and during that time the steamer was at the mercy of the waves. Mr. Moore, while at this work, narrowly escaped death. A big wave swept on board and he was going over the lee rail on it when third engineer Buchanan grasped him by the feet and held on to him, thus saving his life. The man was saturated and chilled and second engineer Spooner relieved him. Several of the

sailors had narrow escapes also from being swept into the sea, and all the men on deck worked for hours with their clothing drenched and frozen on their backs. At 5 p.m. the storm moderated, but the weather was intensely frosty and four feet of ice had formed on the ship's decks when she reached Sydney at 4 a.m. Monday. It took the steamer all Monday and Tuesday to chop the ice off. The Baleine proved to be an excellent sea-hoat and she made the run to Cape Spear from Sydney in 46 hours.

Didn't Advise Owners.

When the Atilla, which arrived here from Brazil last night, was coming down the shore at 8 a.m. yesterday, she signalled Ferryland station and asked to be reported to the owners, showing her house flag. The station answered that this would be done, but it was not. Had it been done, Balne Johnston & Co. would have sent a tug to tow the vessel to port. They cannot understand why the keeper omitted to advise them.
